





**INDIANA YEARLY
FRIENDS' MEETING**

**TO BE HELD IN THIS CITY THE
LAST OF THIS MONTH**

MUCH TO BE DONE

**Meeting Will Be Busy—List of Local
People Whose Terms Expire
This Year.**

The Yearly Meeting of Indiana Friends will be held in this city from September 29 to October 4.

Last year the meeting was held in Marion chiefly to appease the Friends of the northern part of the state, those who wanted to divide the meeting, but at the close of last year's meeting it was decided to hold the session of 1904 at this city, the regular meeting place. There has been a discussion for several years as to whether the Yearly Meeting should be held in Marion or this city, both great Friends' strongholds, and at the coming meeting it is expected that this question will be brought up again.

There will be quite a lot of business up before the Yearly Meeting this year. Many appointments of committees and boards are to be made and a great deal of other and minor business is to be transacted, so that the session will likely be a busy one. Only a few committees show a membership that will not be reorganized, although it is the custom among the Friends for incumbents to hold office for many years, much longer than among other denominations.

Probably the most important places to be filled are those of clerks of the meeting. Local clerks whose terms will expire are C. A. Franciso, A. M. Roberts and Rev. E. O. Ellis.

Of trustees the terms of E. O. Ellis and Timothy Nicholson will expire, although the vacancy caused by the dismissal of Rev. Ellis has been filled.

As trustees of the Woman's Misionary Association the terms of Lucy Binford and Pharia Stephenson expire, and the Rev. Allen Jay's term as a member of the Bible Institute committee will close. Besides these names mentioned, there are several others, not living in Richmond whose terms will expire.

The Yearly Meeting will supply three places on the Board of Sutherland College, three on the Permanent Board, and one on the visiting committee of White's Institute.


