

Discusses Paris Fashions.

Silk That Catches the French Fancy — Stunning Louis and Marie Antoinette Modes



Paris modistes are excelling all their former efforts, and woman is so gowned today that it would require but a slight stretch of the imagination to fancy that one is looking upon an embodiment of a beauty painted by an old master, for indeed nothing of beauty in dress of other eras escapes the arbitors of fashion of this period.

The loveliest toilets now worn at fashionable resorts are nearly all of the Louis XVI order, although the Directoire style is distinctly noticeable.

Trimmings are more ornate and gorgeous than ever, a note of extravagant luxury marking them all. While the cult of the needle will in no wise diminish, trimmings cleverly woven copied from many countries and eras have all the air of handwork and will be extensively used.

An excellent example of artistic weaving is shown as a border on the brown Burlingham Louis XVI coat in my illustration. It is woven as a self-trimming for the Burlingham, and is an acorn design in bright orange silk, running through the creams and deep red yellows to tobacco color, the tones blending with and brightening the gown with true high art effect.

In Paris half the gowns one sees at the fashionable restaurant dinners are of silk, the skirts ruffled tucked and lace-inserted, and the waists treated likewise, the aeme of fashion being reached in the Rajah dinner gown I have illustrated for you. In color it is robin's-egg blue, the shirred Marie Antoinette corsage and full skirt being exquisitely lace-inserted.

Comparisons of today's fashions with the fashion pictures of the periods from which we are now occupying are decidedly in favor of the modern dressmaker and designer. OVERFEED BABIES IS THE TOPIC

AT PHYSIO-MEDICAL MEETING AT INDIANAPOLIS

NEURASTHENIA DISCUSSED

Dr. Harold Gives Causes for Above Troubles—The Meeting Has Adjourned.

Indianapolis, Ind., September 9.—The Physio-Medical Association which has been in session here several days, adjourned yesterday. Dr. C. E. Day read a paper on "Children's Foods" before that meeting.

"The great mistake in artificial feeding of babies," he declared, "is overfeeding. Parents think the baby should be fed every time it cries, no matter if that be every half hour."

"In the medication of children the less medicine used the better, as their little natures do not need medicine at any time, and hot water will do more for them than all the medicines."

He advised catnip tea as a remedy for colic and the resting the stomach of the babe.

In the discussion of Dr. J. N. Harold's paper on "Neurasthenia" Mrs. Bryson, one of the physicians at the meeting spoke in defense of nervous women.

"When your wife pulls your hair, slaps you," she said, "send her away on visit. She is nervous, not angry."

"I have treated women who said they felt as though they were about to scream from nervousness many times each day. One woman would throw stick or her shoe across the room to relieve the nervous strain."

Dr. Harold mentioned as causes of neurasthenia, excessive mental strain, shock, exhausting fevers and other diseases, alcohol, tobacco, tea, coffee, overwork in school or college, neglect of sleep, carelessness in diet and extreme indulgence in candy and sweets. He advised the "best cure," the drinking of much water, bicycling, horseback riding, golfing, electricity and other remedies. Olive oil baths were also recommended.

The Physio-Medicalists appointed a committee consisting of Drs. Duthie, Haggard and M. D. Woodard to confer with physicians of other schools and prepare a petition to the next legislature for a sanitarium for the treatment of consumptives.

The deal was closed yesterday for the transfer of the orphan asylum grounds and building, Thirteenth and College avenue, to the Physio-Medical College of Indiana to be used as a college. Cash was paid to the amount of \$38,000 and a mortgage of \$12,000 was given on the present college building.
