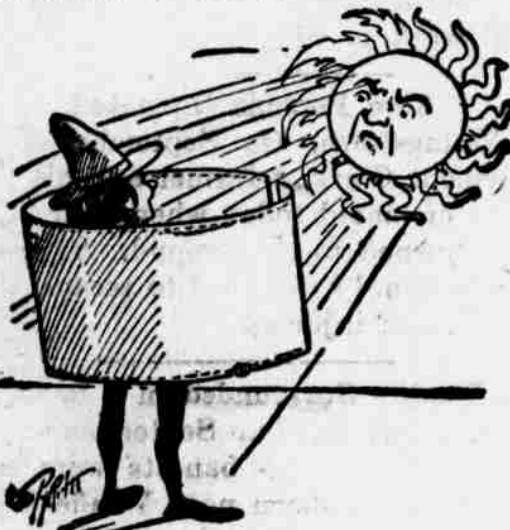

OPENING NIGHT NEW PHILLIPS

LOUD PROTEST

Raised Because of the Epitaph on the Monument.

Wellington, O., September 15.—A monument recently placed in the cemetery here has raised a storm of protest because of the inscription which is upon it. The monument, it is alleged, was ordered by a nephew of the deceased lady, and it is said that he is responsible for the epitaph, which follows:

* Mary M. Lewis, *
* Born November 30, 1830. *
* Died June 18, 1894. *
* * * * *
* I don't care what you say, *
* She would have her own way *
* Now she's under the sod *
* She must submit to God. *

It is claimed that the motive of the author was not to reflect upon the character of the departed, yet the ladies of this place take a different view of the matter, as shown in the local paper:

"In justice to one who cannot speak for herself, we, who have known her for many years, wish to testify to her sterling good qualities and kindness of heart. She submitted herself to her God, years before she was 'under the sod,' and led a consistent Christian life. The only Perfect One once said, 'Let him that is without sin cast the first stone.' The stone has been cast and the enduring words indicate to us no fault of the dead, but at least a thoughtless spirit on the part of the author of the epitaph."

This is followed by the signatures of a great many of the prominent ladies of this place, who were intimate with the decedent.

It is said an effort will be made to remove the stone from the cemetery.
