COAL INDUSTRY IS HAMPERED

SHORTAGE OF CARS FOR SHIPMENT OF DOMESTIC COAL

OVER SUPPLY STEAM COAL

Big Four's Embargo on Sullivan and Greene County Fields Still Continues.

(By Associated Press.)

Terre Haute, Ind., October 2.—Indiana coal mining industry is peculiarly hampered. There is a shortage of cars for shipment of coal for domestic use on account of the large number of cars on the tracks in large cities loaded with steam coal.

There is an oversupply of steam coal, says President Kolsen, of the Indiana Coal Operators' Association, both due to the unusually large output and to the falling off in demand.

The Big Four's embargo on coal from the Sullivan and Green county fields continues. For two weeks no fewer than one hundred cars of coal destined for Indianapolis and the gas belt have been accepted by the Big Four at this point.

Several days ago the Big Four took 25 cars of coal from Southern Indiana for the first time in two weeks.

The shipment of coal billed to northern cities and eastern cities in Indiana by the Southern Indiana railroad to West Port, its eastern terminal and thence north on the Big Four and the Pennsylvania has been
