A HARD GAME ON SATURDAY

EARLHAM MEETS THE BUTLER ELEVEN ON REID FIELD.

IRVINGTONIANS A FAST SET

And the Outcome of the ontest is Decidedly Doubtful.

Saturday afternoon Earlham meets the Butler college eleven of Indianapolis on Reid Field and Butler has it in her head that they are going to do things to the Quakers. The supporters of the local eleven are all charter members of the "Show Me Club." From an Earlham point of view the outcome of the game is a little doubtful and the odds look to be in favor of the Irvingtonians.

For the first time in many years Butler has a good all around team and the showing they have made this season has been excellent, onday for the second time they defeated the Indiana State Normal team by the score of 17 to 0. While Earlham was unmercifully beaten Saturday last by the Wabash team the students were not discouraged as their team went on the field, not with the intention of defeating their opponents but to hold them down to the lowest possible score. No green team could have hoped to have made a much better showing against a team that was composed of veterans and who greatly outweighed them. Wabash and Butler have a date this season and followers of the game in Indianapolis pretend to believe that Butler has a show for victory. This is possible but not probable. Sifting every thing down local "dopesters" figure that if the Quakers will show the form displayed by them in the Wittenberg game two weeks ago, their offense and defense will be about twenty-five per cent. better than the form displayed in the game last Saturday. They also figure that Butler is an inferior team in comparison to the Wabash eleven, so with Butler weaker than Wabash and the Quakers improved over last week's form local cranks say that Butler's chances on the game could not bring better odds than 3 to 2.

St. Louis, Mo., October 31.—Mr. Late Comer is arriving at the Fair in large numbers. He is a dazed, aimless sort of a wag, bumping into every one getting in everybody's way and making of himself a general nuisance. He "put off" visiting the Fair until all at once he realized that he would not see its like in his lifetime, that it is the last great universal exposition, and that he will be very much chagrined at his inability to discuss the features of the Fair with his neighbors and friends who saw it. Or perhaps he was one of those unfortunate mortals who never do the right thing at the right time, and who was afraid of going to the exposition too early and also afraid of going too late. So he suddenly decides to come, throws a few things in a "grip" and deprives his wife of one of the most enjoyable experiences of her life, that of "packing a trunk," and scurries to the train. At the Fair, as I said before, he steps on the toes of those who are trying to see the exposition methodically and systematically, asks all sorts of foolish questions and irritates those who have learned the magnitude of the Fair and have made an intelligent study of it.

But Mr. Late Comer is here and we will have to take him as he is and deal with him gently and sympathetically. No use wasting time in doleful lamentations over his infirmities. He will always be a Late Comer never a first arrival, never a Johnny On-the-Spot. Better be a Late Comer than a Never Was. So we must help him to see the Fair and to have a good time.

And, after all, he seems to have the best of it in a good many ways for the Exposition is making extraordinary efforts to entertain him. There is more "going on" than at any time during the Exposition. He has arrived just when interest in the

airship exhibitions is at its height. Visitors who have been on the ground since last week have already witnessed the flight of two airships, one of which sailed fourteen miles over the city at an altitude of one mile. And there are more exhibitions of this kind to follow. Several of the airships that have been in preparation in the aerodrome have not been brought out as yet.

Over in the barns of the live stock section there is the largest poultry pigeon and pet stock show ever held in this or any other country. There are miles of coops, holding thousands of specimens of all the known fancy breeds of poultry. There are 12,000 fowls and 170 different breeds. One of the interesting features is the daily hatching of chickens by incubator. Following the poultry show comes the largest Flower Show ever held in this country to be held in the conservatory of the Palace of Horticulture, November 7 to 12. Over \$75,000 in cash prizes in addition to fifty gold and fifty silver medals will be offered in the various classes to exhibitors. The big exhibits, of course, will be in chrysanthemums, carnations and roses.

Yesterday the day's program of entertainment was enlivened by the arrival of 1000 students from the University of Missouri and from the School of Mines at Rolla. They brought with them their foot ball team, a brass band, their college yell and miles of black and orange ribbon, all of which did not avail to save them from defeat by the Purdue University football team at the Stadium in the afternoon.
