"Checkers."

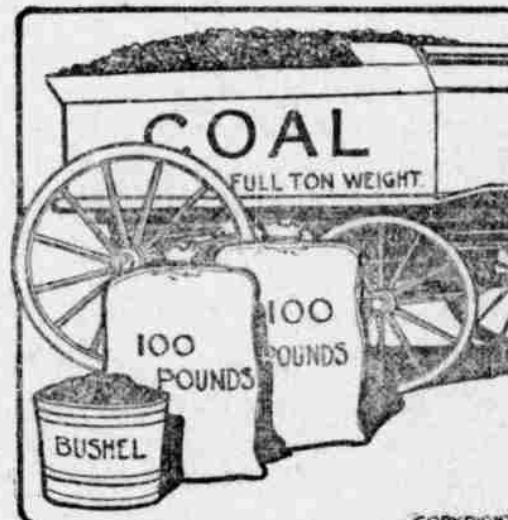
