Annual Session to be held at Anderson January 24-25.

The sixteenth annual meeting of the Indiana State Dairy Association will be held in Anderson Wednesday and Thursday, Jan. 24 and 25. Instructional programs of talks, reports and essays have been arranged, and a feature of the meeting will be the butter and cheese show, in which premiums will be given for the products receiving the highest score from the judges.

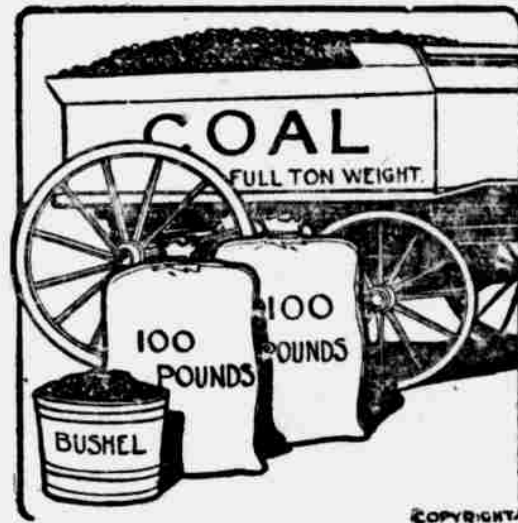
