St. Louis, Jan. 12.—Fritz Borchart, 54 years old, a grave digger, at St. Matthew's cemetery, evidently has become insane because of the grawsmess of his occupation. He is being detained at the city hospital.

He would work for hours in silence stopping now and then to turn an ear expectantly as if afraid of some unseen voice, and at other times acting as if he were listening to words from unseen persons.

From one of his neighbors it was ascertained that Borchart's hallucination has been developing for some time. Several times he had spoken of having conversed with the spirits of the dead, interred at the cemetery where he was employed.

Recently he believed he had committed a sacrifice in using profane words while at work, and for this he was warned by the spirits that as a penance he must refrain from talking for a period of seven days.

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
