## CHURCH AND CLERGY.

The British Wesleyan Methodists have already sold more than 1,500,000 copies of the "word edition" of their new hymn book and more than 250,000 of the "tune book."

Early next autumn the most famous English evangelist, Gypsy Smith, who is a real gypsy, will come to this country to work under the auspices of the Congregational national council.

The nineteenth anniversary of the American Bible society falls on Feb. 25, and the 50,000 Protestant ministers in the United States have been asked to observe that day as "Bible Sunday."

Bishop William Benjamin Derrick of the third Episcopal district of the African Methodist Episcopal church of New York city, has been designated by the bishops' council to go to South Africa and try to adjust the troubles that have resulted in the presiding elders of the South African conference suspending the Right Rev. Charles S. Smith.

## LAW POINTS.

Indictment by a grand jury is held, in State versus Guglielmo (Ors.), 69 E. R. A. 463, not to be necessary to due process of law, so as to preclude the institution of a criminal prosecution by information.

The marriage of a ward, valid where made, in a sister state, is held, in ex parte Chace (R. L.), 69 L. R. A. 493, to be necessarily regarded as valid at his domicile, although it would not have been so had it been solemnized there, because of statutory limitation of his right to contract.

A carrier who negligently delays a shipment is held, in Bibb Broom Corn company versus Atchison, T. and S. F. R. company (Minn.), 69 L. R. A. 509, to be liable for the damages where, because of such delay, the goods are overtaken in transit and damaged by an act of God, even though the act of God could not reasonably have been anticipated.

## TALES OF CITIES.

The board of trade of San Mateo, Cal., has named it "Floral City," and a committee has been appointed to see that it lives up to its name.

St. Louis physicians are to have a "deadbeat" directory. If the book is to be depended upon, there are in St. Louis 15,000 persons who do not pay their doctor bills.

The foreign trade of Philadelphia last year reached an aggregate of almost \$140,000,000, an increase of about \$4,000,000 in exports and \$14,000,000 imports, largely materials for use in American factories.

After thirteen years spent in its construction the new Croton dam is completed. It will hold 30,000,000,000 gallons. This is enough to supply New York city for 100 days without drawing on any other supply or any other watershed.

## INSURANCE REFORM.

Nonunion Substitutes and Battle  
Results.

What Cheer, Ia., Feb. 14.—Sixteen girls employed by the American Garment company here formed a union and struck for shorter hours and more pay. The company immediately secured a crowd of sixteen new girls and started them to the factory. The strikers had pickets out and gave battle to the nonunion substitutes. Hatpins were the principal weapon of warfare, although many had their faces badly scratched and hair pulled before the police were able to quell the riot. The union was overwhelmed and forced to retire.
