JOHN D. CENTRAL FIGURE

ENGLISH PLAYWRIGHT TO BUILD PLAY ABOUT HIM.

He Says The Oil King is Most Interesting Man in the World.

New York, January 15.—Alfred Sutro, an Englishman, who ten years ago retired from the glucose business to write plays, and who in the past few months has leaped to the very core of the English dramatists, arrived on the Lucania today with a burning desire to make John D. Rockefeller the central figure of a successful American play.

"The American multimillionaire is the most interesting man in the world to me," said Mr. Sutro in the Hotel Gotham, after he had ordered his 4 o'clock tea. "He is far more interesting than our aristocrat. The latter is nothing but a most ordinary individual with a title, while your millionaire, who is grasping for control and riches, is a marvelous human engine, never satisfied and continually wearing himself out for what?

"Greater riches and more power. Take Rockefeller, for instance.

My, but I would jolly well like to write a play around him, for he would lend himself admirably to a great drama. I would want to know his soul, and state why a man who gives millions to religion is censured in your newspapers. A person who one day prays his God, and the next devotes every energy to crushing his fellow man, must be a psychological study.

"I would have used him before this, but one must write of the things he knows about. For this very reason I almost wish I had been born in America. Your dramatists have great opportunities, and when I come over again next fall I will make use of some of them. Perhaps I'll put a Rockefeller in a play."

LEASES ANOTHER THEATRE

Manager Murray Has Secured a Theatre at Lima, Ohio.

Manager O. G. Murray, of the New Phillips vaudeville theatre, with Gus Sun, of Springfield, Ohio, has just closed a five year lease on the handsome new \$35,000 theatre at Lima, Ohio, and will open it as a vaudeville house within sixty days, at the end of which time it is expected the builders will turn it over. The theatre is being built by W. L. Russell and C. L. Pope, bankers and real estate dealers, and the bank of Lima, of which Mr. Russell is president, will occupy one of the two large business rooms that will flank the lobby leading into the theatre. The building is new throughout, is modern in every particular and reports from Lima are to the effect that it will be the finest vaudeville house in Ohio. The seating capacity is eleven hundred. The arrangement is such that the theatre can be converted into a combination house at any time that it is wanted for purposes other than vaudeville. Manager Murray is well pleased with this latest deal.

NORTH POLE OUTING

CAPTAIN CLINTON TO PROVE PRACTICABILITY OF AIRSHIP.

Asserts that He Intends to Let Children Enjoy Polar Outing—Is Seeking Necessary Capital.

New York, Jan. 16.—Captain James A. Clinton, for twenty-five years a pilot in and around New York, is confident that he has solved the secret of a practical airship. To prove it he is willing to take the air route to the north pole, guiding his own craft, and taking his six little children as passengers. Other aspiring explorers would better sit up and take notice of what he says.

A propeller driven by a turbine, and capable of either raising or lowering the airship, is one of the secrets of the Clinton craft. Another is the driving propeller, which forces air against the rudder in a manner which enables the ship to be always under control of the navigator, independent of contending air currents, which have proved the undoing of other airships.

Captain Clinton estimates that he can drive his ship about fifteen miles an hour against a ten knot wind, or thirty miles an hour under normal conditions. In case of accident to the gasoline engine, it can be disconnected and a hand device used. Manual power will easily work the turbine wheels.

"I have worked on my airship for nineteen years," Captain Clinton said today. "I believe I now have it perfected. I have invented it on an entirely new principle of air navigation. The same barriers found in air navigation are those present in water navigation, except that in the air one must contend with the forces assaulting from every direction. As long as its aluminum, iron, and silk hold out the ship will find its way all over the earth and against all winds, and never higher than at a safe distance.

"I am experienced in the United States geological survey and not the least doubtful of what I have invented and not patented. I would like a chance to prove, as I believe I can do, that at least one American knows more about airships than any Frenchman who ever tried his hand at the work."
