net, set the house wild by their work.
It is one of the best cabinet turns
that has ever been seen at the New
Phillips. Local men tied Miss Lee in
an effort to keep her quiet in the
cabinet but the effort was a com-
plete failure. It looked for a time as
if Jenks and Clifford, trick tumb-
lers and head spinners, would not be
allowed to leave the stage, so great
was the enthusiasm. As mirth pro-
vokers they cannot be beaten. Cal

WATSON STRONG IN HOUSE

Congratulated by President Roose-
velt on Passage of the Tariff.

Washington, D. C., Jan. 22.—Rep-
resentative Watson received the con-
gratulations of the president on the
passage of the Philippine tariff bill.
The sixth Indiana congressman has
done a lot of hard work in keeping
down the strength of the insurgents
and has been in close touch with the
president right along, and his work
has especially been appreciated by
Mr. Roosevelt.

Mr. Watson is sanguine that the
State Hood insurgents will fall into
line at the critical moment, but he
admits that the vote on the measure
will not be pressed for ten days or
two weeks. He does not believe
that he can get out as large a vote on
the Statehood question as he succeeded
in getting on the tariff bill. Out
of 233 Republicans, 231 were present
and voted.

DIET REGULATES DREAMS

THE RULES FOR PLEASANT VISIONS.

Alcohol and Meat Must Be Barred
If Sleeper Is to Avoid Trou-
blesome Thoughts.

London, Jan. 20.—A new and in-
teresting point in the study of the
occult has been brought to light. It
is the effect of diet on dreams and
communication with the spirit world.
It is suggested that to obtain clear
dreams—dreams which are free from
anything of a fantastic, horrible, or
distorted nature—it is not only nec-
essary to retire to rest with the mind
calm and concentrated, but the body
also must have been nourished with
light and easily digestible food.

Most people have experienced
nightmare, due in the great majority
of cases, to a heavy meal before go-
ing to bed; but apart from this no
person can attain the perfect dream
without a special course of diet.

B. A. Cochrane, of George street,
Manchester Square, who is an au-

said yesterday:

dream is possible on the ordinary

very easily digestible will serve the
purpose. Such a diet will enable
people to get into real touch with the
spirit world, and they will be able to
recollect their dreams on awakening.

"Every night I put under my bol-
ster a plain card and a pencil, and
the instant I awake I write down a
summary of what I dreamed. After
breakfast I write it out fully. Thus
I have a record of my dreams for the
past ten years.

"I have never had what may be
termed prophetic dreams, but I be-
lieve the night time of the body is
the day time of the soul. It is then
that the soul leaves the body and has
experiences in the spirit world which
are very interesting sometimes.

"You may meet with dead friends
and see their condition. I have seen
old friends, once very wealthy, who
are in queer conditions now on the
other side. I have also had spirits
come to me in my dreams. They
have not been able to speak, but by
signs and portents they have con-
veyed their desires.

"Such visions and spiritual com-
munications are possible to any one
who is moderate in his diet, abstains
from alcoholic drinks, and is tem-
perate in all things. Clear dreams
are the result of a healthy mind in a
