# WAS TOO POOR TO VENTURE FAR

BUT ISAAC JENKINSON FINAL-  
LY MADE EXPLORER STAN-  
LEY A LECTURER.

# AN INTERESTING INCIDENT

Recalled by Well Known Richmond  
Man When He was American  
Consul at Glasgow, Scotland.

The Hon. Isaac Jenkinson Satur-  
day strolled into police headquarters.  
Mr. Jenkinson was in a reminiscent  
mood and an interested audience lis-  
tened to some of his experiences for  
an hour or more.

"I take the credit of placing Hen-  
ry M. Stanley, the great African ex-  
plorer, on the lecture platform,"  
said Mr. Jenkinson, "and I am very  
proud of it. At that time of which  
I speak I was the American consul  
at Glasgow, Scotland. Stanley, as  
you know, had been sent to Africa  
by the New York Herald for the pur-  
pose of finding Livingstone, the great  
Scottish explorer, who was lost in  
Central Africa.

"Stanley found Livingstone, and  
on his return to London, he was a  
very much sought after man, but the  
young newspaper man was very busi-  
ly engaged in writing a book con-  
taining the account of his travels and  
adventures and did not go about  
much. I was well acquainted with  
the Livingstone family who lived at  
Glasgow, and their gratitude to Stan-  
ley knew no bounds. The citizens  
of Glasgow were anxious to show  
some mark of respect to Stanley and  
the lord provost, or mayor wrote to  
him, inviting him to Glasgow as the  
guest of the municipality. There  
was no response to the first invita-  
tion and the second and third invita-  
tions met with a similar fate. I  
knew that Stanley was very poor and  
I at once guessed why he paid no at-  
tention to the communications from  
the lord provost. I then took the  
matter in hand and wrote to the  
young explorer telling him that if he  
came to Glasgow I would guarantee  
him the best banquet he ever attend-  
ed and five lectures, one in Glasgow,  
and four in nearby towns. I also  
guaranteed him \$200 a lecture. The  
day following the receipt of my let-  
ter Stanley wrote that he would ac-  
cept my offer. These five lectures  
were the first that Stanley ever de-  
livered and he was greeted by im-  
mense crowds."

# TO RENUMBER HOUSES.

unsystematic way of numbering the

gard to system and much confusion  
has resulted to strangers who have  
been looking for numbered houses in

Football Hero was Honored.

Cambridge, Mass., Jan. 23.—F. H.  
Burr, the giant guard on the Harvard  
football team last year, got the first  
honor in the gift of the freshmen  
class, the presidency, in the election.  
It was expected that Theodore Roose-  
velt, Jr., would get one of the offi-  
ces, but his name was not mentioned,  
at his request. He sat in a front  
row voting eagerly, watching events  
closely, but said nothing.

The fight was really between Mt.  
Auburn street and the rest of the  
college, which combined against the  
rich men. The only man put up  
against the gridiron hero, who made  
the all-American team, was O. Ly-  
ding, of New York, representing the  
scholarly inclined.

Among the men who were active in  
canvassing for Burr was young  
Roosevelt, who spent considerable  
time electioneering. Roosevelt got  
the chairmanship of the committee  
on smokers and for the present he  
considers this honor sufficient.
