## IS FOUND GUILTY IN SLOCUM CASE

CAPTAIN CONVICTED OF CRIMINAL NEGLIGENCE, GIVEN TEN YEARS.

## STATE CAPITOL SCANDAL

New York's \$30,000,000 Building at Albany Defective and Investigation Is In Sight.

New York, Jan. 28.—A jury before Judge Thomas in the United States Court found Captain William E. Van Schaick guilty of criminal negligence in failing to maintain a system of fire drills on board the excursion boat General Slocum, which was burned to the water's edge in June, 1904. Van Schaick was sentenced to ten years in Sing Sing at hard labor.

Van Schaick is over 60 years old and was regarded as one of the best river captains in the employ of the Knickerbocker Steamship Company. The verdict, and especially the sentence, came as a great surprise to those in the courtroom. The jury disagreed on the first two counts, but the third and most important, that of criminal negligence, was agreed upon within twenty-three minutes after retiring from the court room.

Ex-Judge Dittenhoefer, counsel for Van Schaick, made a number of appeals for delaying sentence and objected to the verdict, announcing that he would take an appeal. Van Schaick had the jury polled at his own request and seemed stunned by the verdict.

Judge Thomas remarked that although in the mind of the captain himself, as well as in the opinion of others, it might be deemed unduly harsh to pronounce sentence for the mere failure to maintain drills, yet he felt that the sentence of ten years was warranted by the letter of the law.

A number of friends and relatives of those lost in the Slocum disaster who have been in constant attendance at the captain's trial, were in the court room when the verdict was announced. They seemed pleased at the long term of years to which Judge Thomas sentenced Van Schaick.

The assembly staircase in New York's \$30,000,000 capitol at Albany, which has been under suspicion for several months, has been ordered closed on the ground that it is unsafe for use. It is believed by those familiar with the conditions that part of the building will be out of use for two or three years while repairs are being made. The engineers have informed the state architect that the integrity of the capitol building as a whole should be investigated, including tests of the foundations.

## UNDERGRADUATE COACHING

The Advantage Derived From It in College Athletics.

Among the mass of otherwise impracticable and narrow suggestions that have been made relating to university sport in general and foot ball in particular, two, in my judgment, are the best I have ever seen in print and eminently pertinent to the college athletic problem. One was offered by President Wilson and the Faculty Committee on Outdoor Sport at Princeton. It reads:

"That all coaching by men who are paid in any way, directly or indirectly, or who receive their expenses, or any part of them, be done away with."

I unqualifiedly endorse the spirit herein expressed, but I believe the sense of the resolution will be broadened and the latter the easier of fulfilment by further providing that all official coaching be done by undergraduates. This, in a word, would put it up to the captains of the various athletic teams and crews. And why, after all, is not that the true thought of college sport? As Princeton offers the resolution it would certainly revive those unfortunate disputes and recriminations of which we formerly had so many and now hear too often. We all know the "amateur" coach who receives no pay "directly or indirectly," yet comes early and stays on without other visible means of support. Such a question could never arise if the coaching was for the greater share confined to the undergraduates themselves. It seems to me that the wisest and easiest of enforcement would be a rule restricting the actual field coaching to undergraduates but allowing advisors provided they were alumni and not paid. This would lessen to a minimum the chance of rule evasion and yet maintain the tradition and the spirit and the interest that comes from graduate association. In a word, it is the Oxford and Cambridge plan revised a bit to fit American spirit and conditions.
