PRESENT CHAMPION MADE A

QUALIFYING SCORE OF 84,

WHICH WAS LOW IN COMPARISON—HIBBERD TIED ARNOLD.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., July 11. (Sp.)—

W. C. Hibberd carried off the highest honors of the Richmond golfers competing in the Seventh annual tournament of the Indiana Golf Association, which opened today upon the links of the Country Club at Indianapolis. Mr. Hibberd tied with Ernest Arnold, of Indianapolis for fourth place with a score of 90, which was very good, compared with the rest of the scores for the qualifying rounds.

Dr. Bond also qualified, getting a score of 92, which gave him a tie with W. Y. Coburn, of Indianapolis for eighth place. William Diddle of Indianapolis, the present champion, started out like a two time winner, getting the best score of the qualifying rounds with 84.

President M. M. Townley has appointed the tournament committee as follows: W. H. Coburn, Country Club, chairman; W. C. Hibberd, Richmond, and William Donaldson, Highlands. In all contested points the decisions of the committee will be final.
