## KID HERMAN WAS GIVEN DECISION

He Outpoints Benny Yanger in Their Ten Round Bout at Indianapolis.

## IT WAS A PRETTY FIGHT

HERMAN HAD THE BEST OF IT ALL THE WAY ALTHOUGH YANGER FINISHED FRESH—FOUR THOUSAND PRESENT.

Indianapolis, Ind., Aug. 10. (Spl.)—Before the largest crowd that ever attended a boxing show in this city, Kid Herman defeated Benny Yanger in a ten rounds battle tonight at the West Washington Ball Park. From the first tap of the gong till the decision was awarded to Herman, the little boys were up and doing all the time. It was seen that Herman had a shade the best of the argument, although Yanger made a sensational finish at the end, but notwithstanding this, Referee Abe Pollock of Chicago, awarded the bout to Herman on the grounds that he had outpointed his Italian rival.

The two principals have trained long and hard at their training camps at Broad Ripple and Cedar Lake, and both were confident of winning tonight's battle. Herman wanted to retrieve his decisive defeat of two years ago at the hands of Yanger and Yanger wished to win back much of his lost standing. Before the bout started the betting stood 10 to 7 in favor of Herman.

The decisions of Pollock were greeted with mingled cheers and hisses. The advantage which Herman had was slight, although impartial judges admit that he had a little the best of it all the way through. Not a drop of blood was spilled. Both fighters lacked a good hard punch.

The crowd numbered four thousand, four hundred of whom were women.

In the semi-final bout which was to decide the county and state championship, Ray Bronson won over Mickey Ford in a fast go.

Since Herman has defeated Yanger and has proven himself a stayer, he will challenge the winner of the Gans-Nelson fight, which will be pulled off in Goldfield, Cal., soon. Herman is confident that he can give either of these boys a battle royal and in case he challenges either one of them he will probably be accepted for a "go" as he has clearly demonstrated himself a ring general of no mean ability.

Bishop Lawrence's Denial. Boston, Aug. 10.—So much annoyance has been caused to the Right Rev. William Lawrence, Episcopal bishop of Massachusetts, by the flood of letters which has been pouring in for several months regarding the so-called "endless chain of prayer" which was alleged to have been started by him, that the bishop has found it necessary to issue a denial that he is connected with the matter.

Machinists' Protest. Sedalia, Mo., Aug. 10.—More than 200 machinists at the Missouri Pacific shops quit work on the completion of nine hours' work and left the shops. The walk out was a protest by the machinists against the violation of an alleged agreement between the shopmen and the officials of the operating department. The strike may spread to the boilermakers and other employees at the shops.

Threw Himself From Train. Cincinnati, O., Aug. 10.—Estella Bloomingdale of Marietta, O., leaped from the window of the Baltimore & Ohio Southwestern train eastbound, near East Madisonville, and received injuries which may prove fatal. The train was going forty miles an hour, but was stopped, and the woman taken on to Loveland, where she was transferred to a city bound train and was placed in St. Mary's hospital. She appeared morose on the train and deliberately threw herself out.

Antwerp and Shipping. Nearly one-half of the shipping traffic to and from Antwerp is carried on under the British and American flags, and this has made Antwerp almost an English speaking port. Free night schools for exclusive classes in English, organized by the city authorities, are attended by thousands of pupils, while special attention is paid to the study of English in all the grades of the day schools, public as well as private. This desire to popularize the English language is not confined to Belgium, but has extended to Germany as well, where schools of instruction have already been established at Munich and Nuremberg by the German government.
