"I run fast enough," shouted Donnelly, as the boat floated out into the river, "but I didn't start in time."

### Thomas Jefferson—Gennett.

Thomas Jefferson who is the only Rip Van Winkle of the Jefferson family, and the senior actor of that name, holds with distinction the affectionate well wishes of a vast public, which has grown to love his late father, Joseph Jefferson, who has passed to a higher life.
