## EVIDENCE GIVEN AGAINST COMPANY

Many Witnesses Were Heard in Inquiry Into Atlantic City Wreck.

## TRAIN GOING VERY FAST

CLAIMED THAT BRIDGE TENDER HAD A QUARREL WITH YACHT CAPTAIN JUST BEFORE THE WRECK OCCURRED.

Atlantic City, N. J., Nov. 5.—The inquiry into the wreck on the Pennsylvania railroad's electric railway at the Thorndike drawbridge in which more than 50 persons lost their lives, was resumed by the coroner of Atlantic county. Great interest is still centered in the investigation. Joseph Dangerfield, who lives near the scene of the wreck, was fishing on a near by bridge when the wreck occurred. He said that Captain Kessler, of the yacht Sinbad, for which the draw had been opened a few minutes before the train came along had a quarrel with Bridge Tender Stewart over opening of the bridge. Witness said he heard the captain say: "I'll fix the third rail." Dangerfield said he believed Kessler meant he would have Stewart discharged for alleged slowness in opening the bridge. The witness said that the ill-fated train was traveling over the bridge at a higher rate of speed than that of many other trains that had gone over it.

Lloyd Brier, an assistant city electrician, proved an interesting witness. He said he had been employed on the new electric road during the past summer and several times noticed that the rail which is believed to have caused the wreck stuck. He had driven it down himself several times. He did not know what caused the rail to stick, unless it was because it had not been properly laid.

## Woodruff's Claim.

New York, Nov. 5.—Timothy L. Woodruff, chairman of the Republican state committee, said that he regards the election of Charles E. Hughes as practically certain. "Mr. Hughes will get 150,000 or more above the Bronx," said Mr. Woodruff. "Mr. Hearst cannot get more than 50,000 plurality in the greater city, according to the computation of his own managers, and in my opinion the Greater City will come close to giving Mr. Hughes a plurality."

**Banker Joins Labor Union.**  
New York, Nov. 5.—Banker Jacob Schiff has become a member of the Journeymen Stonemasons' and Setters' union, No. 54. With due solemnity the millionaire financier has pledged himself to have nothing to do with a non-union job and not to work for less than 70 cents an hour. Schiff got his card when he became a union stonemason, in order that he could lay the cornerstone of the new synagogue of the First Hungarian church.

**A Suicide.**  
Columbus, O., Nov. 5.—The dead body of Carl DuBois, 25, of 68 Wood avenue, was found near the plant of the Columbus Packing company where he had been employed. Two bullet holes in his mouth and a revolver at his side indicated that he had committed suicide. A week ago he was found unconscious in his room, having taken poison and had been cared for at the Emergency hospital until he was discharged.

**Returns to His Cell.**  
Arapahoe, Okla., Nov. 5.—W. G. Lewis, who is charged with murder, escaped from jail with five other prisoners in a carefully planned delivery and after roaming around town for several hours, returned and locked himself in his cell. All the time he was at liberty the jailer, J. W. Kellum, was locked in a cell where he had been thrust by the prisoners before they made their escape.

**Commander Wounded.**  
Nizhni-Novgorod, Russia, Nov. 5.—Colonel Bozhanoff of the Viborg regiment, of which the German emperor is honorary commander, was seriously wounded by a bullet fired by a member of his own command while the soldiers were practicing volley firing with blank cartridges. It is said that the shot was fired accidentally.

**Killed in a Fight.**  
Bedford, Ind., Nov. 5.—Ezra Kinzer struck and killed Edward Deckard with a club during a fight at a resort on the hill in the northern part of this county. Kinzer is being searched for by the authorities.
