

## CHIEF DINAN IS TO BE DEPOSED

Head of Police Department to Be Temporarily Dismissed by Commissioners.

### REMOVAL IS NECESSARY

BOARD IS SAID TO FAVOR THE SUPERINTENDENT BUT PENDING INVESTIGATION IT IS FORCED TO TAKE ACTION.

San Francisco, Dec. 2.—Chief of Police Dinan, indicted on charges of conspiracy and perjury, will be suspended at Tuesday's meeting of the police commissioners, the members of the board say.

The commissioners are personally friendly to Dinan but they confess that they must take some cognizance of the indictments against him.

Two courses of action have been considered by the members of the board. The chiefs suspension pending investigation of the charges against him and his summary dismissal from office.

Two of the commissioners are said to have made up their minds some time ago that the scandals in which Dinan is involved make his removal necessary and that nothing was to be gained by delay. They have been prevailed on, however, to agree to an opportunity for an inquiry.

Dinan has been on the police force for years and owed his appointment as chief to Mayor Schmitz's personal friendship.

## THINK THE PRINCE INSANE

### OFFICIAL DENIAL GIVEN

Heir of the Throne of Serbia is Said to Be Mentally Incapacitated and Will Never Be Able to Rule His People.

Belgrade, Dec. 2.—The report that Crown Prince Kara Georgevitch has become insane and that he will be confined in a foreign asylum has caused great excitement in Belgrade despite the fact that it has been officially denied that there is any truth in the rumor. Prince George, accompanied by the officer on duty and Premier Pasquich walked through the streets of the city yesterday it is thought in the hope of proving that he is not seriously ill. It was noticed, however, that the two men with him kept close on either side of him and he failed to respond to the salutes of the townspeople.

People close to the throne, declare that, while the future monarch is probably not violently insane, there is no doubt that he is not strong mentally and he is hardly likely to ever resign as king.

## HORRIBLE ACT OF AN INSANE MOTHER

Tries to Burn Her Children to Death and Knocks Husband Down With Ax

### FATHER SAVES CHILDREN

BARELY ABLE TO CRAWL UP. STAIRS INJURED MAN PUTS OUT FLAMES AND RESCUES LITTLE ONES.

Hopkinton, Mass., Dec. 2.—Mrs. Charles Stewart while insane dressed herself in black, locked her three small children in a bed room, set fire to her house, knocked her husband down with an axe and escaped. It is feared that she has killed herself and searching parties have not yet found her.

Stewart with one hip badly wrenched and his head badly cut, crawled up stairs, broke in the door and found his children nearly overcome by the brisk blaze of old papers under the lounge. He got his children out and succeeded in putting out the fire. Mrs. Stewart was on furlough from an insane asylum.

## PASTOR WAS ASSAULTED

### ASSAILANTS RECOGNIZED

Fight Between Temperance and Saloon Forces at Crawfordsville Takes Form of Personal Attack on Anti Saloonist.

Crawfordsville, Ind., Dec. 2. (Spl.)—A bitter temperance war which has been waging at New Richmond for some months, led to a brutal attack Friday night on the Rev. H. C. Riley, pastor of the Methodist church, who has been active in the suppression of "blind tigers."

Under cover of darkness he was seized at his own gate and severely beaten. The minister recognized as his assailants Tom Patton and Grover Shotts, well known young men of the town, who are identified with the anti-temperance faction. They had been summoned before the grand jury during the day and chose this method of venting their spite.

They have been arrested and will be prosecuted to the extent of the law. The Rev. Mr. Riley has received anonymous notes of a threatening character heretofore, and of mornings it has been no unusual occurrence to find his front porch decorated with empty beer bottles and bundles of switches.

## FORTY THREE WERE KILLED IN MONTH

An Alarming Number of Fatalities Caused by Chicago Street Cars.

### REPORT FOR NOVEMBER

NOW THAT HOLIDAY TRADE IS ON IT IS FEARED THAT DEATH RATE WILL BE EVEN HEAVIER THAN HERETOFORE.

Chicago, Dec. 2.—Forty three Chicagoans lost their lives in street car accidents during November.

The figures are officially reported by the coroner and the city officials supplement them by the statement that most of the accidents were due to the criminal carelessness of the traction companies.

That the holiday rush will treble the number of fatalities is the prediction of City Transportation Superintendent Doty.

Mayor Dunne, who has failed in one attempt to secure a grand jury investigation of the street railroad company's methods, propose now to arrest not only the street railway officials, but the passengers who are responsible for overcrowding.

Corporation Counsel Lewis has advised the Mayor that it is "unwritten law" that the police may interfere to save human life. His assistants in the legal department do not agree with him, holding that, while the ordinances prohibit "overcrowding," is.

The bluecoats have already assumed supervision of the traffic in the business portion of the city with the result that, though traffic has been greatly delayed, the number of accidents within the past few days has been considerably lessened.

## ROBBERY OF A CRUISER

### MUCH SILVERWARE GONE

The Minneapolis Robbed of Valuables to the Extent of \$4,000 While at League Island—Wes Kept Secret Several Days.

Philadelphia, Dec. 2.—Silverware and valuables, including the handsome service presented by the city of Minneapolis, have been stolen from the cruiser Minneapolis at League Island and secret service men are searching pawnshops here and in neighboring cities in an effort to recover them. The total value of the articles stolen aggregates \$4,000.

The robbery occurred November 23, but the navy yard officials concealed the fact in the hope that they could quietly track the thieves. Every employee and uniform man in the yard has been searched, questioned but to no purpose.

## WILD MOB PURSUES A NEGRO MURDERER

Scott met the negro on a highway and requested the settlement of a debt. Without warning Farrows fired on Scott with a double barreled shotgun, reloading the weapon and discharging a third load into the prostrate form. The fate of the assassin is certain should he be captured.

## DEATH OF "BLACK PATTI"

### THE END CAME SUDDENLY

Flora Batson, the Famous Concert Singer Passed Away in Philadelphia—Had Sung in the Courts of Europe.

Philadelphia, Pa., Dec. 2.—Flora Batson, known on the concert stage as the "Black Patti," died suddenly in this city today of uraemia. Although only about thirty five years of age, she had acquired considerable reputation as a singer, not only in this country, but in Europe. When quite young she sang for Queen Victoria, who with her own hand presented her with a silk union-jack. Her majesty, after the young girl had sung "The Last Rose of Summer," said: "My child, you are truly a graduate of that institution presided over by Almighty God, and from which hive, a drone has never issued. God bless you in your sweet mission of song."

Black Patti sang also for Pope Leo, the Czar of Russia and at the Italian and German courts.

Her death was caused by a stroke of the heart, which occurred in Providence, R. I., with her parents.

## SUITS AGAINST RAILROADS

### ORDERED BY ATTY. MOODY

Government Will Make an Attempt to Recover Penalties From Violations of the Safety Appliance Law—After Panhandle.

Washington, Dec. 2.—Attorney General Moody has directed that more suits be brought against a score of railroad companies to recover penalties for violation of the safety appliance law, through failure to keep their equipment in proper condition. The largest number of violations attributed to any road is 42 against the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul, 23 being in the northern district of Illinois and 6 in the eastern district of Wisconsin.

The Pennsylvania system is charged with a number of violations while the C. & L. has escaped without fault being found with it.
