UNION PROPOSED BETWEEN CHURCHES

May Be an Early Merging of The Baptists and the Disciples of Christ.

CONVENTION NEXT WEEK.

GATHERING AT CINCINNATI WILL BE ATTENDED BY MEMBERS OF THE LOCAL CHRISTIAN CHURCH.

Although the revival meeting at the local Christian church will be in full swing next week, it is probable a number of members will attend the national convention of the church to convene in Cincinnati April 4. With a proposition before it looking toward the merger of two great religious denominations, this the ninth annual congress, will be of national importance and of great significance in the religious world.

Committee Was Named.
At the 1906 congress held in Indianapolis, a committee of ten was appointed to make overtures and formulate a plan of closer relations between the Baptists and the Disciples of Christ, commonly known as the Christian church. This committee will report at the conclusion of the three days' session at Cincinnati. Its report will advocate the merger of the two churches and it is probable that an agreement will follow, which, within the next few years bring about a complete consolidation.

In Favor of Union.
Several of the leading Baptist ministers and those of the Disciples church favor the union of the two and think a few differences which now exist and which stand between the union, should be set aside that a broader and better work might be accomplished.

The convention will convene in the Central Christian church Wednesday, Thursday and Friday of next week. Three sessions will be held daily, at 8 and 9:30 a. m. and at 2:30 p. m. Preliminary to the convention a session of the American Christian Education society will be held Wednesday morning.
