HAS BEEN DELAYED**

No Advance on Grain Until the First of May, It Is Now Announced.

CONFERENCE AT CHICAGO.

THE PENNSYLVANIA ACTED WITH THE OTHER ROADS IN THE MATTER—RICHMOND DIVISION WAS REPRESENTED.

Local railroad freight officials have announced that the increase in grain rates, which was to have taken effect April 1st on all railroads will be postponed till May 1st under a special dispensation granted by the Interstate Commerce Commission. According to the statements of a local official yesterday, the Pennsylvania has practically cleaned all its grain traffic up along the lines but shippers on many other lines in Indiana and Ohio, in conference with railroad men in Chicago, Friday, asked that the railroads postpone the raising of the rates until the many millions of bushels of grain now laying in the ware houses was moved. An amicable agreement was reached by the interested parties, which resulted in the postponement of the date on which the increased grain rates will become effective. The movement of the large quantity of grain cannot be made at present owing to the scarcity of cars, and the railroads, wishing to take no unfair advantage of the shippers, and knowing that the car shortage was largely through the management, postponed effective rate.

Local Division Represented. The Richmond division was represented at the meeting in the Windy City, and according to the representative's statement, the railroad men after once filing notices that a certain freight rate will go into effect, then have to appeal to the Interstate Commerce commission before this can be set aside or postponed. He said that the Pennsylvania acted with the other and more seriously affected roads in the matter, in that it would not be wise to raise the rates over those charged by the more affected roads.

GRAND JURY WILL BE GIVEN A LEAVE

As Members Are Farmers, They Will Be Allowed to Attend to Spring Work.

BUSINESS IS NOT URGENT.

IT IS PROBABLE THAT AFTER ORGANIZATION NOTHING WILL BE DONE FOR A PERIOD OF TWO WEEKS.

Prosecutor Jesup Saturday afternoon asked Judge Fox if he would excuse for a week longer the members of the grand jury for the April term of court immediately after they had met Monday and organized. The prosecutor stated that there would be but little work for the jury to transact this term of court and that all of them would be seriously embarrassed if they had to transact this business immediately.

"All the members of the jury are farmers," said the prosecutor, "and all of them right now are head over heels at work on their farms. I also understand that two of the jurymen have been unable to secure farm laborers to assist them in their work, and if these two men were called from their farms for the next week or two, it would be a great hardship to them."

Judge Fox stated that as the jury work they would be called upon to do was not pressing, he would permit an adjournment after Monday until later on in the term.


