MEAT INSPECTION TO BE CONSIDERED

Committee of the City Council Probably Will Meet on Wednesday Night.

GENERALLY SATISFACTORY.

NOTHING WILL BE DONE IN REFERENCE TO MILK INSPECTION UNTIL MEAT SITUATION IS DISPOSED OF.

The ordinance committee of the city council probably will meet Wednesday evening of this week to consider the meat inspection ordinance presented to council at the last meeting by the special committee appointed to draft it. If the meeting is not held Wednesday night it will be held Saturday night. It is understood that the ordinance

committee will not recommend the passage of the ordinance as it now stands, as there are some provisions of minor importance in the measure which have brought forth objections from the local butchers.

Generally is Satisfactory.

On the whole the ordinance is satisfactory to the ordinance committee and to the butchers. When the ordinance in its revised form is presented to council Monday evening of next week it is probable it will be passed under suspension of the rules as the councilmen realize that to take advantage of the federal government's offer to furnish local meat inspectors is open only for a limited length of time and that this city to take advantage of the offer made will have to act promptly.

The special committee appointed by council to investigate the meat and milk question has not yet begun its investigation of the best course to pursue in inspecting milk. Councilman Bartel, who is on the committee, states that the committee would not take up the milk question until the meat inspection question had been definitely settled.

RICHMOND MAY GET IN MINOR LEAGUE

Manager Jessup Urges Indiana Trolley League to Play On Week Days.

SUGGESTION CONSIDERED.

GOOD BASEBALL PEOPLE ARE BEHIND THE MOVEMENT AND THERE ARE PROSPECTS OF IT BEING SUCCESSFUL.

If the plans of the trolley baseball league managers, who met at Indianapolis Sunday materializes a new minor league will be formed in this state, including Richmond, Ft. Wayne, Lafayette, Muncie, Anderson and some other towns of like standing which are not in a league at the present time. The league if it goes through will owe its origin to Clarence Jessup, the local baseball manager.

Manager Jessup, by buying out Manager Huckins of Dayton, secured his franchise in the recently formed trolley league which had originally intended to play Sunday ball. Jessup attended a meeting of the managers in the league at Indianapolis, Sunday and suggested that it might be possible to form a minor league playing week day ball as well as Sunday games. Some of the managers were a little reluctant about trying the week day proposition. A sort of compromise between the Sunday and week day plans was suggested in the nature of a Saturday and Sunday league. The last named plan and Jessup's project to establish a new minor league are being considered by the various managers interested and a decision will be reached at a future meeting to be held soon.

The sporting editor of the Indianapolis Star is the moving spirit in the baseball league agitation and this means plenty of publicity for the enterprise. Manager Jessup is hopeful of a strong league of some kind being formed.

Gave the Red Cross.

MRS. SCOTT WAS ALSO BADLY HURT

Daughter of Mrs. Sherry Suffered From the Fatal Stroke of Lightning.

ELECTRICITY IN BODY.

ENTERED HER BODY CLOSE TO TEMPLE AND CAME OUT NEAR HER HEEL—A MOST PATHETIC ACCIDENT.

Hagerston, Ind., April 9.—The funeral of Mrs. Monroe Sherry, who was killed by lightning Sunday afternoon, has been postponed until Wednesday at two o'clock. The services will be held at the Christian church, with interment at West Lawn.

Mrs. Lulu Scott, the daughter, who was with Mrs. Sherry when the bolt struck, and who was believed at the time to have been but slightly injured, really suffered greater harm than was supposed. Her hearing, which was totally destroyed for a time, has returned, but her nervous system is badly impaired and it is feared her complete recovery will take a considerable time.

Aside from the hair being slightly burned on one side of her head, there is slight mark of the track of the bolt that caused the death of Mrs. Sherry. To little marks, no larger than scars which might be made by a curling iron, are near the temple. It was there the fluid entered her body and came out near the heel.

Neighborhood Mourns Death.

When the flash came Mr. Sherry and his son-in-law, Johnny Scott, were seated near a window where they saw the lightning strike the building which the women had entered but a moment before. They ran out and found Mrs. Scott lying on the ground while her mother was sitting upright with her head but slightly bent forward. She never regained consciousness. The sorrow manifested by the neighbors of Mrs. Sherry is

something unprecedented. Every neighbor for miles around tearfully testifies to her amiable, sympathetic and charitable nature. To describe this as the saddest accident that ever occurred in this vicinity, is but the echo of the general sentiment.

The Stormy Gulf.

The gulf of Mexico is a water of storms, not frequent, but fearfully violent. It is, in effect, an immense scallop cut from the land and hurricanes seem to gravitate to it naturally. They are born in the neighborhood of the Saragossa sea, strike the West Indies and not infrequently leave those islands at a tangent, just as a ball thrown at an oblique angle against a wall slides along it for a little space and again seeks vacancy. These erratic forces of the air strike the coast of Mexico or the coast of Texas, according to their angle, and death is in their track. The things called "tidal waves" in that section are not really tidal waves. They are not caused by an upheaval. They are merely local in effect. They are not vast walls of water moving with resistless speed and weight over the face of the ocean. They are waters banked up against a low coast by wind pressure until they overflow. In many instances the submergence is gradual, and ample opportunity for escape is given. Other times the violence of the air makes them sudden, and people are drowned.—St. Louis Globe-Democrat.
