JOHN FORD, FARMER
IN POLICE COURT

Took on Too Much Booze and Came to Grief While Driving a Hog Wagon.

COLLIDED WITH PHAETON.

FORD WAS MUCH HUMILIATED, PAID HIS FINE, STOOD FOR DAMAGES AND HASTILY CLIMBED ON THE WATER WAGON.

John Ford, a farmer residing five miles north of the city, appeared in police court this morning for the first time in thirty years, according to his statement. Ford arrived in this city Friday afternoon on board a live stock wagon laden with a cargo of hogs. Ford anchored his craft in front of a north end saloon and then began to ship a varied assortment of booze, as the result of which he became very intoxicated.

Staggering out of the saloon he again went aboard the hog wagon and ran it amuck on North Sixth street in the general direction of Main street, thereby creating much excitement among the residents of North Sixth street.

Near the corner of Sixth and Main street stood a horse and phaeton belonging to a farmer. In the rig was the farmer's wife and her young child. The fast driven pork wagon with every hog aboard, squealing from terror in keys varying from shrill treble to chest tone grunts, bore rapidly down on the phaeton. Then of a sudden there was a crash and one of the rear wheels of the phaeton was ripped off by coming in contact with the starboard side of the pork cart. The woman and her child, clinging frantically to the phaeton and saved themselves from being pitched into the street.

Ford, unmindful of the ramming of the phaeton, continued on his reckless course until a blue coated custodian of the law blocked the path of the runaway hog wagon. This morning Ford stated that he did not remember any of the incidents in which he played the part and appeared to be deeply humiliated over his conduct. PITIFUL CASE WAS
HEARD IN THE COURT

Mrs. Jennie Hittle Punished For Her Conduct Toward Erva Fourman, aged 16.

TOLD TO LEAVE TOWN.

JUDGE CONVERSE HAD SHOWN LENIENCY ONCE BEFORE BUT ACKNOWLEDGED THAT IT WAS A MISTAKE ON HIS PART.

One of the most pitiful cases ever heard in the police court, came up this morning. The principals in the case were Mrs. Jennie Hittle, aged 19 years and Erva Fourman, of Sabina, O., aged 16 years. Both young women were arrested Friday afternoon for improper conduct. The Fourman girl was bound over to the juvenile court and the authorities will take some steps to save the child from the life which she has begun under the tutelage of the Hittle woman, who despite her age, is a hardened woman of the world, absolutely brazen and indifferent to her actions. Mrs. Hittle was fined \$10 and costs and given a thirty days' jail sentence. "When you have completed serving your time in jail I would advise you to leave the city. The community will not tolerate you," said Judge Converse. This statement was received by Mrs. Hittle with a sneering smile.

The Fourman girl, very poorly dressed, slight, and evidently not impressed with the seriousness of her offense, appeared in the witness chair against Mrs. Hittle, to whom she is distinctly related by marriage. The girl told a straight forward story. She stated that she came to Richmond last week at the invitation of the Hittle woman and then launched into a story of depravity that cannot be printed. She told how the Hittle woman had introduced her to men of evil reputation, she also told of midnight carousals, buggy rides, etc., until the tale became almost sickening.

Mrs. Hittle is separated from her husband, and for some time past has not been living as she should. Not long ago she was in trouble for some offense, but no action was taken against her by the authorities owing to some tale of woe she recited to Judge Converse and Prosecutor Jessup. Judge Converse told the woman that he had made a mistake in ever believing her and that he could not express his opinion of a woman who would help in the ruin of a young girl.

Well Known Farmer Dies From Effect of Dropsy.

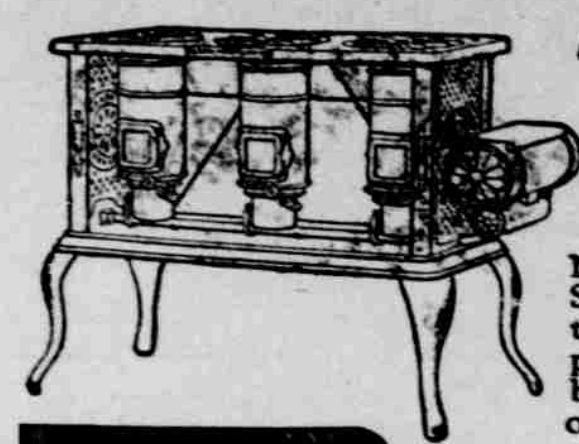
BROTHER OF JOHN DECKER.

HORSE THIEF CHASE
IS ON FULL FORCE

Scene Changed From Wayne And Preble Counties to Washington C. H.

HORSE IS HARD DRIVEN.

THE ANIMAL HAS SHOWN WONDERFUL POWER OF ENDURANCE—NOTHING HEARD OF THIEF SINCE FRIDAY NOON.

The chase after the elusive Knights-

town horse thief is still on in full cry.

The scene of chase has now changed from Wayne county and Preble county Ohio, to the vicinity of Washington C. H., Ohio, where it is expected the thief will be finally run to earth. Four members of the Henry County Horse Thief Detective association are assisting Mr. Hiday, the owner of the animal. Last evening they passed through this city on an interurban car bound for Dayton. In that city they expect to pick up a hot scent which, it is thought, will lead them to Washington C. H.

Officers Liversberger and Bundy gave chase to the thief Friday morning in a phaeton. His trail was picked up at Chester and followed in an easterly direction three miles north of New Paris, then toward Eldorado. A short distance north of Eldorado the officers lost the trail at a cross roads. Every effort was made to pick up the trail, again, but the farmers living in that vicinity stated that they had not seen a horse and buggy of the description furnished by the officers. Friday evening a farmer living southeast of Eldorado, informed the police that the thief had inquired of him the road to Dayton and Washington C. H. This information gave a clue to the destination of the thief.

The endurance shown by the stolen horse is regarded as remarkable. The animal was stolen at 9 o'clock Thursday evening, and from information picked up by the police, it was kept in continual motion from that hour until

til nearly noon Friday. That was the time the thief was last heard of. The proprietor of a store at Bracketsville, O., states that the thief bought two cigars while there, but did not water or feed his horse. He stated that the animal was beginning to show the effects of his hard journey.
