MANY MORE CAUGHT IN THE JURY'S NET

New Indictments Are Returned Against Schmitz, Ruef, Calhoun, Glass and Others.

CHARGE OF BRIBERY MADE.

BONDS REACH A TOTAL OF HUNDREDS OF THOUSANDS—THERE IS PROMISE OF A GENUINE CLEANING AT SAN FRANCISCO.

San Francisco, Cal., May 25—The grand jury late Friday afternoon filed nineteen indictments against Mayor Schmitz, Abraham Ruef, Patrick Calhoun, president of the United Railroads; Thornwell Mulalley, his assistant; Tirey L. Ford, ex-attorney general of the State, counsel for the United Railroads; William M. Abbott, Ford's assistant; Louis Glass, vice president of the Pacific States Telephone Company, and Theodore F. Halsey, "outside man" for the same company.

Ruef, Schmitz, Calhoun, Mulalley, Ford and Abbott are charged with bribing fourteen supervisors to grant an overhead trolley franchise to the United Railroads. Schmitz is further charged with bribery in connection with the fixing of the gas company's rate and with receiving \$5,000 in the United Railroads' franchise deal.

The indictments against Glass are additional to the eleven indictments already returned against him on the charge of bribing supervisors to refuse a competitive telephone franchise. The indictment against Halsey is for the offense.

Superior Judge Coffey fixed bail in the sum of \$10,000 on each of the charges.

As the same price prevails at the local stores this is no inducement, but right here is where the slick agent gets in on the deal. He offers to enlarge a picture "free" and about seven out of every ten women bite at the bait. They pass out a photograph from the home album, the agent agreeing that the picture must be equally as good in every respect, as the same he carries, which is very good. In a few days another slick individual comes along and delivers the soap, collects his fifty cents. He is a collector and knows nothing about your picture, the work, he says, being done in Toledo, O. He has samples of frames which he offers to sell you at a bargain, charging meanwhile more than the same frame could be procured for from your local dealer. Six out of every ten women grab at this scheme, through the oily talk of the agent, and he takes \$1.80 of your money and passes on, having secured \$2.30 from you. Then you wait for your picture. CITY SCHOOLS GAIN OVER THE COUNTRY

Figures on the Enumeration In Indiana Made Public by State Superintendent.

TOTAL IN INDIANA 778,811.

RICHMOND SHOWED 4,924 IN 1906 AND 5,028 IN 1907—WAYNE COUNTY IS EIGHTEENTH IN NUMBER OF CHILDREN.

Figures on the school enumeration of the state, just compiled by Fasset A. Cotton, state superintendent of public instruction, show a big gain in the number of school children in the state, but not as heavy a gain as that of 1906 over 1905. The figures also show that there was a marked decrease in the number of children attending the country and town schools and a corresponding increase in the children in the city schools, indicating that the farmers are sending their children to cities in order that they may derive benefit from what they consider better school advantages.

The total number of school children in the state this year is 778,811. This is a gain of 4,133 over 1906, when there were 774,674 children in the city schools of the state, while last year the number was 281,446.

City Schools Gain 10,230. The city schools this year show a gain of 10,230 over last year. This year there are 291,676 children in the city schools of the state, while last year the number was 281,446. Owing to the present controversy between Ft. Wayne and Terre Haute over the latter's reported enumeration to the state superintendent, the Ft. Wayne people contending that Terre Haute's enumeration has been padded, Supt. Cotton used in giving the enumeration of Vigo county the Terre Haute enumeration reported last year, pending his investigation. The enumeration of South Bend for last year is used also, pending an investigation of that city's enumeration. Should the reports from these two cities be sustained, the total increase in the state for 1907 over 1906 will be much larger. Richmond in 1906, showed 4,924, while this year her enumeration shows 5,028.

The figures presented give Wayne county a total for 1907 of 99,781, a loss of 33 over 1906. There are 17 counties in the state that exceed Wayne.

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IS ONLY SHORT TIME FOR SECURING SEATS

There Are Plenty of Good Ones Still Available for the May Music Festival.

The executive board hopes that the sale on Monday will be of such size as to insure the financial success of the festival.
