There is no fear that any harm has happened to him and no search will be made. Meantime his family, consisting of his wife, and three children, will continue to manage the Newcomb house.

LOVE AND SORCERY STIR WINCHESTER

Witchcraft Is Said to Affect A Large Number of People There.

ALL UNDER QUEER "SPELL"

WOMAN ACCUSED DENIES ANY OTHER POWER THAN THAT OF PLAIN FORTUNE-TELLING—A RICHMOND WOMAN NAMED.

Winchester, Ind., June 1.—Witchcraft of the most virulent type, the first on record since the memorable affair at Salem, nearly 200 years ago, is reported to be existent here, and a number of families in the south-western corner of the city have been thrown into an uproar. And now if the people of Winchester see an old woman riding toward the moon on a broom stick and the old black cat behaves strangely and starts to talking, they will not be surprised, and the good housewife will know whom to blame when the cream sours prematurely and the bread refuses to raise.

Traced to Love Affairs.

Mrs. Lizzie Anderson is the woman who is accused of casting spells, and she vigorously denies the charge. The exposure of the strange case grew out of the love affairs of Della Mills-Davis-Loy, who might in classical terms be called a modern "Donna Juanita." Quite a while ago, Della, whose maiden name was Mills, married young Isaac Davis and lived happily with him for some time. Finally, however, it is alleged, she began to look with favorable eye upon the graces of Abraham Loy and to wish that she had never captured Isaac. Della claims that she sought the advice of Mrs. Anderson, who was a "seer into the unseen" and that the latter presented her with a vial containing a concoction of human hair, toe nails, a small stone and some sort of a mysterious liquid. This was to be buried in the garden and when the mixture decayed the dissatisfied wife would be freed from her husband. In addition, Della says, the sorceress pricked her knuckles and sprinkled the blood in Abe's hat rim to insure his captivity.

Then a Separation.

In a short time the married couple separated, Della got a divorce and then married Loy. And, recently, it is alleged, Della again became dissatisfied and desired to have her first love back again. She once more consulted Mrs. Anderson and Isaac Davis, the first husband, still faithful, secured a mysterious vial from a Mrs. Krug in Richmond, who seems to be a partner of the local priestess. Soon after this however, Della began to experience strange spells of fainting and sickness. She immediately became alarmed and resolved to consult the local officers, and gave up her precious bottle, fearing that Mrs. Anderson had cast a spell over her. In this manner the strange story was brought to light.

Detective Fletcher resolved to investigate and went to the home of Mrs. Lida Davis, the mother of Della's first husband. He found Mrs. Davis and her daughter, Mrs. George Crawford, who is very ill, in a high state of nervous excitement. According to the story of the two women Mrs. Anderson had threatened by her magic to have "all the Davis family inside of hell within a year." Mrs. Davis said that the so-called sorceress wrote all of her names on a piece of paper, wrapped the missive in a hair ball, threw it into the well and ran around the house three times to complete the spell. As long as the family remained in that house, she continued, none of them was in good health and Mrs. Crawford, who appears to have lung complaint, feared that the sickness was due to some sort of magic.

Mrs. Anderson was then visited and she denied having any supernatural power, whatever, and says that her only gift lies in the art of telling the future with cards. As to the incident of the hair ball and the well she charges that Della performed that deed herself at a time when she had fallen out with her husband's family.

VESPER SERVICES AT FIRST PRESBYTERIAN

SMITH SUCCEEDS NEWMAN.

Instead of abandoning the Sunday evening services during the summer, as has been the custom in past years at the First Presbyterian church, a series of Sunday evening vesper services will be held, to begin June 16. They will be held at five o'clock each Sunday from that time indefinitely. It is the plan to give a gospel concert. The problem of getting Richmond people to attend Sunday evening service has long bothered the minds of the pastors. It is thought by the congregation of the Presbyterian church, that the vesper service will attract many to the church who would not attend Sunday night services.

At the monthly session of the church Friday night, Jonathan Newman resigned as secretary of the sessions and A. L. Smith was appointed to take his place. Mr. Newman served in the capacity of secretary since 1893.

NOAH DUMM HAS SUED FOR DIVORCE

Troubles of the Whole Dumm Family Are Being Aired in The Local Courts.

MUCH TO COMPLAIN OF.

EDWARD GANDELL ALSO SUES FOR DIVORCE AND SAYS HIS WIFE USED CIGARETTES AND SPENT TIME WITH OTHER MEN.

Suit has been filed in the circuit court by Noah Dumm against Louisa Dumm. The domestic troubles of the whole Dumm family were recently given an airing in the city court. In his complaint Mr. Dumm states that he was married in 1903 and that four weeks after the ceremony Mrs. Dumm left him. She was returned to his home by her father a short time later but she continued her practice of leaving without notice up to the time they separated this spring.

Dumm alleges in his complaint that Mrs. Dumm never lived with him during their married life for a period exceeding three months. He also avers that when she did live with him she refused to cook, do any washing or, in fact, attend to any of her household duties. This, Dumm alleges, necessitated him getting the meals for himself and his wife and to attend to the other household duties.

He states that on May 10, this year she caused his arrest on a charge of assault and battery by swearing out a false affidavit against him in the city court. Judge Converse found Dumm not guilty of this charge.

Another interesting divorce suit, that of Edward Gandegg against Gertrude W. Gandegg, has been filed in the circuit court. In his complaint Gandegg states that he was married in 1903 but that he separated from his wife in 1906 on account of her wrongful conduct. Gandegg states that his wife spent her time with other men, that she drank and that she smoked cigarettes to excess.

HENRY PETERSON IS DETERMINED TO DIE

Eccentric Character Makes Another Unsuccessful Effort to End His Life.

HE USED A BROAD-AXE.

THIS WAS RESORTED TO AFTER A DULL POCKET KNIFE HAD PROVED INEFFECTIVE—NOT HIS FIRST EXPERIENCE.

Henry Peterson, one of Richmond's most eccentric characters, unsuccessfully attempted suicide, early Friday morning by trying to cut off his arm, first with a dull pocket knife and then with a broad-ax, not vastly dissimilar from those carried by the Roman gladiators years ago. It all occurred at his home, corner of South Ninth and I streets, between the hours of four and six in the morning.

Mr. Peterson has told the family, who have been residing with him, several weeks ago that he wanted to die, and the sooner it came the better. Last week he drank two quarts of whiskey in an attempt to end his life, and came very near crossing the great divide. Through the heroic efforts of his physician, however, he was restored to life, but again Friday morning he was seized with one of his frequent mental attacks and attempted to cut his arm off, a few inches above the wrist in order that he would bleed to death. The dull knife which he was using at the time was ineffective and he secured, a broad-ax, laid his arm on the bed and struck it with the sharp edge of the ax. The arteries were severed, but he was so weak, owing to the loss of blood while using the knife, he did not completely cut off the injured member, the bones remaining intact. He bled profusely and his room was bespattered with blood, where he had moved about the room suffering awful agonies. Then becoming alarmed for fear he would really die he ran into the street and began crying for a doctor. He was at that time pale and fainting from the loss of blood. Being aroused by his cries the people residing in the same house with Peterson, went to his rescue along with several neighbors. He was carried into his home where a successful attempt was made to stop the flow of blood and a physician was summoned who took several stitches in sewing up the wound.

Peterson has been on the verge of death since his attempt, but is now gaining strength slowly. Peterson has long been eccentric and according to the statements of his own daughter, his mind is unbalanced at times, making him a constant care upon those residing with him.

In a conversation with his daughter, Friday, Peterson stated that should he ever live over the present effects of his attempt at suicide, he would find a way to end his life, as he wanted to die and would not live, despite those watching him to prevent him from harming himself.

Several years ago Peterson became despondent and attempted to kill himself by mutilating himself with a chisel.

A GEOLOGICAL SURVEY BY GEO. H. ASHLEY

State Geologist Blatchley Has Secured Help.

SOIL SURVEY IS NOW ON.

State Geologist Blatchley has returned from Washington, where he has been attending the annual meeting of the state geologists of the country. While there Mr. Blatchley made arrangements with George H. Ashley of the United States geological survey to assist him during the summer of 1908 in gathering data for a bulletin on the coal resources of the state, intended as a supplement to Mr. Blatchley's coal report of 1898. Mr. Blatchley has begun the work of making a soil survey of the state with the purpose of ascertaining which soils predominate in each county and which is best suitable for the various kinds of crops. C. W. Shannon is already at work on this soil survey. He has completed surveys of Washington and Martin counties and is now at work in Lawrence county. From there he will go into Orange county.
