Tea on July 23rd. Eaton, O.—Miss Mary Mitchell has issued invitations to a tea to be given on the afternoon of July 23rd.

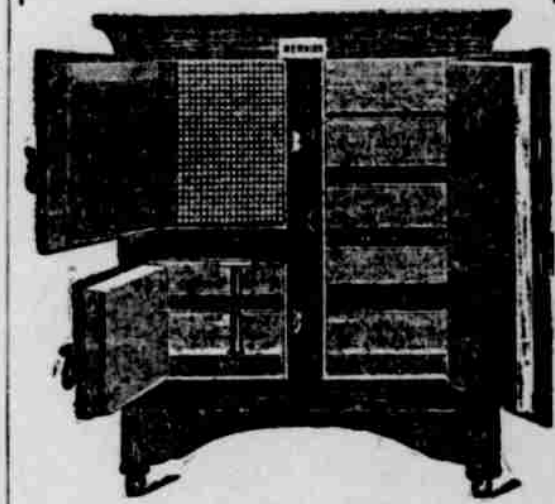
Regular Preaching. Robinson Crossing, Ind.—Regular preaching at Robinson Chapel next Sunday. All are welcome.
