**COL. HOLLOWAY IS
INJURED BY A FALL**

Former Richmond Resident
Thrown From Street Car
At Indianapolis.

A CUT ON THE FOREHEAD.

UNLESS THERE ARE COMPLICATIONS OF SOME SORT IT IS BELIEVED HE WILL FULLY RECOVER.

Indianapolis, July 10.—While returning from Broad Ripple last evening Col. W. R. Holloway, formerly of Richmond, was thrown from the car at Pennsylvania and Ohio streets as he was attempting to alight. He fell head foremost to the pavement, cutting a wide gash in his left brow, bruising the forehead and face. He was for a time unconscious. He was carried to a nearby pharmacy, where his wounds were dressed and was later taken to his home in a carriage.

Col. Holloway was stricken with apoplexy some time ago, impairing his speech and the control of his muscles. Being a very heavy man, in addition, he was slow in alighting from the car and the motorman started ahead too quickly, it is said.

Col. Holloway is one of the most interesting men Indiana has given to public life. He has been engaged in writing his memoirs of the civil war when he was private secretary to Governor Morton, his brother-in-law, for whom he carried many messages to the front and to Washington. He has known almost everybody in public life in Indiana for fifty years. He was former consul-general to St. Petersburg and later to Halifax.

Unless complications arise either from the shock of the fall or from the apoplexy, it is said that the accident will not result seriously.

**SCHWAB SAYS THERE
WILL NOT BE WAR**

Uncle Sam Can Build Battle
Ships Very Fast.

PLEADS FOR SHIP SUBSIDY.

New York, July 10.—Charles M. Schwab has voiced his belief that there will be no war between the United States and Japan despite the proposed sending of an American fleet of nineteen battle ships into Pacific waters. As president of the great Bethlehem steel plant and maker of armor plate and guns, his declaration is of the most important in the question of American display in Pacific waters.

Mr. Schwab made the positive statement that the United States can build five battle ships to Japan's one, and that in the event of war between this country and Japan the United States would be able to build and equip war vessels of all descriptions in faster time than any other country in the world, England and Germany not excepted.

Yet, in almost the same breath, while breathing optimistic conviction regarding the potentialities of the United States in war time, Mr. Schwab was equally emphatic in the declaration that without a ship subsidy the building of American war vessels and a mercantile marine will soon be abandoned by every private corporation in the country.

He made the definite announcement that under no circumstances would he bid again for the construction of American battle ships under present conditions. He said the great shipbuilding plant of the Union Iron works at San Francisco was for sale to the government.

BACK TO BOYHOOD HOME.

**TELEGRAPH STRIKE TO
SPREAD EAST SOON**

President Small, Angered at
Refusal to Meet Men.

OPERATORS RENEW FIGHT.

Oakland, Cal., July 10.—Following the refusal of Assistant General Superintendent Miller of the Western Union Telegraph company, to meet a committee of the striking operators, President Small of the Telegraphers' union will leave today for the East, where he will call a strike, evidently at Chicago and other Eastern cities.

Mr. Miller refused to let the committee enter his office, but sent them a note stating that he would meet them as individuals if they sought reinstatement, but would meet no union man as such.

President Small of the telegraphers, much disappointed at the failure of a peace conference, issued the following statement:

"I feel absolved from further responsibility, inasmuch as I have made every effort, before and after the strike occurred, to bring about a conference. In the future we will have to pay less attention to the feelings of the opposition and public opinion and carry on our fight with more determination and with the one object in view of crippling the enemy until they are willing to meet us in a peace conference. Future moves will be forcible and decisive."

STORM AT LYONS STATION.

Considerable Damage Was Done to
Trees and to Roofs.

Lyons Station, Ind., July 10.—The wind storm Saturday evening did considerable damage through these parts, especially to trees. Several sheds were blown over and barns unroofed.

STORM VISITS STRAUGHN.

Damage Was Done to Buildings, Trees
and the Crops.

Straughn, Ind., July 10.—A severe wind storm passed through this place Saturday evening and did a great amount of damage. Buildings, telephone poles, trees and growing crops suffered much.

**LAWYER DENOUNCES
EXPERT EVIDENCE**

System Tramples on Justice
And Befogs Jury.

INDIANA ATTORNEYS MEET.

Indianapolis, July 10.—"I think I am not stating it too strong when I say that there have been times within the last twenty years following the trial of cases that have attracted wide-spread attention when every person who had closely followed the evidence was convinced that justice had been trampled on and the jury befogged by the brazen falsehoods and mendacious opinions of professional experts and times when, if the matter had been specially submitted to the popular judgement and decision, the whole institution of expert evidence would have been swept away with one mighty blast of public disapproval."

This was the keynote of a speech delivered at the State Bar association meeting yesterday by Charles Kellison, an attorney of Plymouth.

"In the address of the president, Daniel Fraser of Fowler, he discussed the courts and the legislature.

"Beyond mere physical and administrative affairs," he said, "the acts of the legislature until they are brought to their notice by the assertion that rights are created thereunder or liabilities imposed thereby. And it is very seldom that they are content to recognize and admit without dispute the validity or construction of any law which, when applied to their conduct and affairs, works any hindrance or hurt to them. And before any law receives the sanction of our people it must be shown by practical illustration in the open court house, where every man has his day, and said his rede concerning it, that greater good than evil will attend its progress."

"In the main the courts have been faithful to the great trust reposed in them, and right well they deserve the confidence of the people."

Charles W. Miller, former attorney general, created something of a sensation in the meeting by his attack on the criminal code of the state and the state supreme and appellate courts. He declared that the criminal code of Indiana "is almost worthless."

STORM WAS VERY SEVERE.

One of Worst of the Season at Robinson's Crossing.

Robinson's Crossing, Ind., July 10.—One of the worst storms of the season passed over this vicinity Saturday evening, carrying destruction in its path. Fruit trees and forest trees suffered alike, also fences and buildings. On the J. M. Carlos farm, a strip of timber over 200 yards in width was laid low.

LAND FOR NEW CEMETERY.

Thirty-five Acres Will be Secured by
Eaton Authorities.

Eaton, O., July 10.—The township trustees will hold an extra meeting Thursday morning, when a deed from Bunker and Albright to the trustees will be made, conveying 35 acres of land for a new cemetery. The land lies south and west of the present cemetery.

WILL REMODEL CHURCH.

Christian Congregation at Straughn
is Quite Active.

Straughn, Ind., July 10.—The members of the Christian church will remodel the church and will soon begin work on it. Part of the material is on the ground.
