George Morris, another ex-Dunkirk player, batted his old college chum to the four corners of the lot, making four hits, two of which were doubles. His play at short stop was the fastest seen here this summer.

Young Conner served the dinks for the visitors and he proved to be a puzzle to the Van Wert batsmen. Conner was in splendid form and was given magnificent support, the Quaker infield working like a clock. Rabbit Ritter played a good game on the bases, scoring three runs. Every time the little fellow reached first the faithful bat of Morris sent him across the pan.

Richmond copped a run in the first and in the third inning put the game on ice with their bats. Conner singled, Ritter drew his base on balls. Conner was then caught off his base. Cameron sacrificed Ritter and Morris scored him. Wiltemood reached base on a single and Meredith was given his base on balls. At this juncture Minzler poled out a hot double, counting Morris and Wiltemood. Meredith tried to score on the same hit but was cut down at the pan. Richmond is playing again at Van Wert. Fleming is down to pitch this game and the fans can look for another victory. Wentz will twirl the game Thursday.

According to the reports of the game Tuesday at Van Wert, Conner was in wonderful form. Just a few days ago the fans were slating the big Dublin recruit in the "won't do" class. If Conner can continue to deliver the goods like he did at Van Wert he will be one of the most valuable members of the team. All he needs is confidence in himself—he has the goods.

Van Wert has released Right Fielder McCann and First Baseman McElwain. Both of these players phoned Manager Jessup Tuesday and asked for jobs but they were informed that their services here were not required. Imagine replacing Cameron with McElwain. McCann is the player who about two or three weeks ago, when Richmond first played at Van Wert, made a home run, nearly causing himself, the spectators and his fellow players to cash in with heart failure. McCann previous to making this bingle could not hit a collection of rain drops with an umbrella.

Decatur persists in hanging on to Richmond in the league race. The Admirals are due to drop as Bluffton will probably take them, while Richmond should win hands down from Van Wert.

Portland has been strengthened by two good players, Catcher Harden, late of Hartford City, and Hurst, the hard hitting Frankfort outfielder. Kokomo has a fast bunch, which is due to hit its stride at any time. Manager Jessup figures that he will have to beat Kokomo and Portland for the pennant and he picks the former outfit as the most dangerous.

Richmond is playing high grade ball at the present time. That peach infield continues to remain a stone wall while Ritter and Wiltemood are getting away with everything coming to them. Fleming is in a class by himself as a pitcher. The team has a lot of pepper, is hitting the ball well and Tuesday the base running of the locals was the feature of the game.

CORRECTION IN THE SCORE.

Footing in Recent Report From Cambridge City Incorrect.

Cambridge City, Ind., July 31.—A correction of the score of the Grays & B. game at this place last Sunday as printed by the Palladium is necessary. HIDALGO FIRST IN A HEAT.

STARR KNEW WHAT HE WAS DOING AND WENT HOME WITH FIRST MONEY IN A 2:06 RECORD.

Cleveland, Ohio, July 31.—The second poolless meeting of the Cleveland Driving park began Tuesday and the circuit campaigners were greeted by a fairly large crowd. A fast track and bright day added to the general interest. The feature of the opening day was the Thistle-down stake for the 2:15 class pacers. Reproachless, owned by Gen. W. B. Shisholm, after whose stock farm the stake was named, was picked to win the event, and she fulfilled expectations, but not until she had been forced to reduce her record nearly two seconds. Hidalgo was the principal contender and forced Reproachless to pace the first heat in 2:04½. Reproachless was tired in the second heat and Hidalgo won out after a great finish with Leland Onward, Reproachless being fifth. Hidalgo took his first record, 2:04½, the fastest heat of the race. Hidalgo looked like an easy winner in the third heat. Reproachless was fifth at the half, but Starr began his drive at that time and Reproachless came on like a whirlwind, mowing down her adversaries in order, nipping Hidalgo at the wire in 2:06.

STANDARD OIL CO. IS
IN FOR ITS TROUBLES

Taxing Officers of Indiana on Its Track.

FULL RETURNS WITHHELD.

Charges made against the Standard Oil company in the appeal of George E. Clarke, assessor of Vanderburg county, against the assessment of the Standard Oil company of Indiana at Evansville have opened the way for an investigation of returns made by the Standard to county boards of review in those counties of the state where the Standard owns property.

Clarke made the charge that the Standard did not give all of its property in its returns to the Vanderburg county board of review. Robert Gunton, manager of the plant at Evansville, admitted this before the state board of tax commissioners yesterday. The county assessors of the state, according to Clarke, have started a movement whereby a general investigation is to be made for omitted property belonging to the Standard Oil company as far as ten years back. A thorough search is to be made, and when it is found, if such property there be, it will be placed on the tax duplicates and assessed as omitted property.

GEORGIA WILL BE "DRY"

Prohibition Bill Passed and Senate Will Concur.

MEASURE UP TO GOVERNOR.

Atlanta, Ga., July 31.—The Hardman-Covington prohibition bill passed by the Georgia senate some days ago, was adopted by the house last evening by a vote of 139 to 39. Two amendments added to the bill by the house will necessitate the bill going back to the senate for concurrence of which there is no doubt and the bill then will go to Governor Hoke Smith for his signature, which has been practically pledged and prohibition will become a law in Georgia. The amendments permit the sale of pure alcohol by retail druggists on the prescription of a reputable physician and also allow wholesale druggists to carry pure alcohol in stock for sale to retailers only. The bill prohibits the manufacture or keeping on hand in any place of business the sale or giving away to induce business within the state of any liquor that may produce intoxication. The new law is to become effective Jan. 1, 1908.
