Mr. Horn increased the avoidpouse of his batting average by pulling out three clean singles. Mr. Minzler, our miniature second bagger, also inflated his batting average, securing a pretty single and a screaming three bagger, which was driven to deep center. The kid also performed nicely around second base.

T. Ritter has returned to that dear New Castle—at least he was seen headed in that direction Saturday morning—so in the absence of Rabbit, Manager Jessup placed Wiltermood in left field. Wiltermood has grown barnacles on his fins during the time he has been held in captivity on the bench, and as a result dropped a foul fly and a fair fly in rapid succession in the fourth. Manager Jessup chased him to the bench again and substituted Fleming, who performed satisfactorily.

Horn was touched up for eight hits by the Jays, but he only allowed them to bunt bingles in two innings. Three hits in the third netted one run and two hits, one a double, scored the second run for the Jays in the seventh. Just to show the visitors that his heart was in the right place Horn struck out Durham, Carmony and J. Bambrugh in the ninth. This feat greatly pleased the thimble full of constant readers who infested the park.

Minzler scored the first run for Richmond in the second, counting on a sharp drive by Horn. Jessup got a life on Durham's error in the third and came home under Carlin's high floater to Durham. The locals made four runs in the seventh, just after Portland had tied up the game. With one down, Horn and Fleming singled. Grey messed Fleming's hit in the left and Horn counted, Fleming going to second. Jessup hit to Bradbury who tried to get Fleming at third, but failed on account of a poor throw.
