FELL OVER LOVER'S BODY.

Columbus, O., Sept. 25.—Mrs. George W. Kelly, with whom young Howard Rhoades was infatuated, and who committed suicide Monday night at her home, ended her own life in a tragic manner today. Visiting an undertaking establishment where the remains of the Rhoades boy lay, the woman drank a bottle of carbolic acid and fell dying across his bier.
