RICHMOND EXTENSION WILL NOT BE BUILT

Indianapolis and New Castle
Traction Line.

McGOWAN IS INTERESTED.

Work on the Indianapolis and New Castle traction line is being pushed by the contractors in charge of the work. A crew of men is working from New Castle southward while another is leaving Indianapolis toward New Castle. The grades are just being made the greater part of the way, and the services of the farmers and their teams along the route are employed to make them. Poles have been erected the whole distance and the trolley and feed wires stretched. But few miles of track has been laid, however. There is no hope of completing the line before January 1.

The Richmond extension of the road has been passed up for the present at least. It is understood that one of the largest silent stockholders in the line is Hugh McGowan, the traction magnate and through his influence Richmond was given the "key" to the line. Branches will be built to Muncie and Winchester and thence on east to Toledo eventually.

BARN IS DESTROYED AT CAMBRIDGE CITY

Grant Wright Suffers a Loss
Of About \$700.

KITZELMAN LOSES \$400.

Cambridge City, Ind., Oct. 2.—A destructive fire from an unknown origin, burned the barn and its contents owned by Grant Wright, the street car conductor, about one o'clock this morning. The barn of Claude Kitzelman, President of the First National Bank, was partially destroyed. A pony, vehicles and other contents were gotten out without damage. The resident properties of Mr. Wright and Mr. Kitzelman, were both damaged from the intense heat, and were only saved by the prompt and effective work of the fire department.

The loss to Mr. Wright is estimated at \$700 and Kitzelman's probably \$400. The fire originated in Mr. Wright's barn and as there had been no member of his family in the barn during the evening the fire is supposed to have been the work of incendiary.

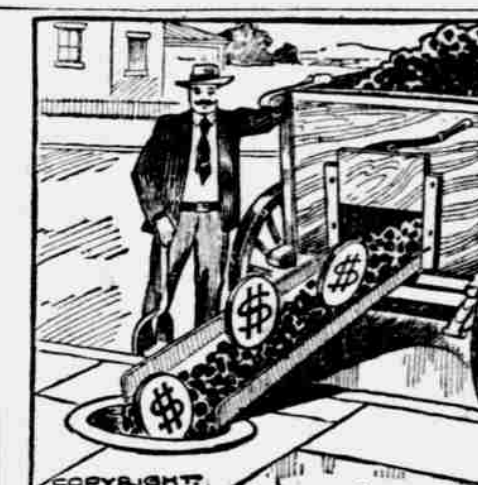
