### QUAKERS ARE DOING BATTLE WITH REDS

The Cincinnati National Team Is At Athletic Park This Afternoon.

#### A GOOD CROWD IS OUT.

CAPTAIN JESSUP AND, BOB EWING ARE OLD TIME FRIENDS, STARTING THEIR CAREERS AT THE SAME PLACE.

Notwithstanding the fact that the eyes of Richmond fandom are directed toward the world's base ball championship series in Chicago, a large crowd is at Athletic park this afternoon witnessing the game between the Richmond aggregation of ball tossers and the Cincinnati Reds. Cincinnati arrived in Richmond with a strong lineup, but notwithstanding this, the local team was hopeful. Before the game Capt. Jessup made the assertion that Richmond was going into the game to win and local fans hoped to see the high score chalked on their side of the ledger. Weaver could not be induced to return to Richmond for the Cincinnati game and Richmond presented the same lineup as it did last Sunday, except that Pink was expected to be in center field.

When Bob Ewing, the famous Red pitcher arrived in Richmond today there was a warm greeting between him and Capt. Jessup of the local team. Both men started their careers in the base ball world at Wapakoneta, O., several years ago. Jessup at that time caught Ewing and they were great friends. Ewing while sitting underneath the grandstand one day told his comrades that some day he would be pitching in a big league and all his teammates at that time would look up to him and eagerly read in the newspapers accounts of his success. It being said in a jocular vein the matter was then taken as a joke.

Ewing bears a scar on one of his hands where Jessup once cut him with a knife while the two were scuffling.

The gerrymander, as called from its author, Elbridge Gerry, is a division of political boundaries by one party so as to insure the defeat of political opponents by placing them in districts containing a majority of hostile voters. It has been worked successfully in hundreds of cases since Gerry first tried it, although it is playing out as a political expedient. The gerrymander often defeats its purpose, as in the case of the late President McKinley, who was gerrymandered out of congress in the old Sixteenth Ohio district only to be elected governor of the state for two terms by the Republicans and thence to go to Washington twice as president of the United States. Gerry first saw the light on July 17, 1744. He was vice president under Madison and had a long and distinguished career as a statesman.—Pittsburg Chronicle-Telegraph.

### Pay of German Letter Carriers.

Letter carriers in Berlin begin on a salary of 900 marks (a mark equals 23.5 cents), with an allowance in addition of 300 marks per year for rent, and receive but 1,500 marks after years of service. They work twelve hours a day and the average weight of mail delivered daily is 150 pounds except when the American mails arrive, which increase it to 300 pounds. Appointments are made by examination, and preference is given to those who have served in the German army.—London News.

### TIGERS AND CUBS ARE DOING BATTLE

World's Baseball Championship Began in Weather Near Frost-Bitten.

#### RECORD CROWDS ARE DUE.

PROBABLE WINNER IS SOLE TOPIC OF EXCITED FANS—THE BETTING IS EVEN OR SLIGHTLY IN FAVOR OF CHICAGO TEAM.

Chicago, Oct. 8.—The opening game of the world's championship baseball series today will probably be played under a clear sky, but with a temperature too low to be entirely comfortable to spectators. According to predictions a stiff wind will blow across the diamond from the northwest and the mercury, which fell sixteen degrees Monday afternoon, will probably stand in the fifties.

That a record-breaking crowd will be on hand to witness the contest is evidenced by the enthusiasm everywhere apparent, the games being the chief topic of conversation on every hand.

Reserved seats have all been sold out for weeks, and the grounds were thrown open at noon to care for the rush for the remaining seats.

Three pitchers on each side will be depended upon by their clubs, according to present plans for the series. Manager Chance figured upon using Overall in the first game, Pfeister in the second and Reulbach or Brown in the third, returning Overall for the fourth game if he pitches good ball in the opening contest. Lundgren and Fraser will be held in reserve.

Hugh Jennings, manager of the Detroit team, planned to start the struggle with Donovan in the box. George Mullin is slated for the second game and Ed Sliver for the third, and coming back with Donovan in the fourth.

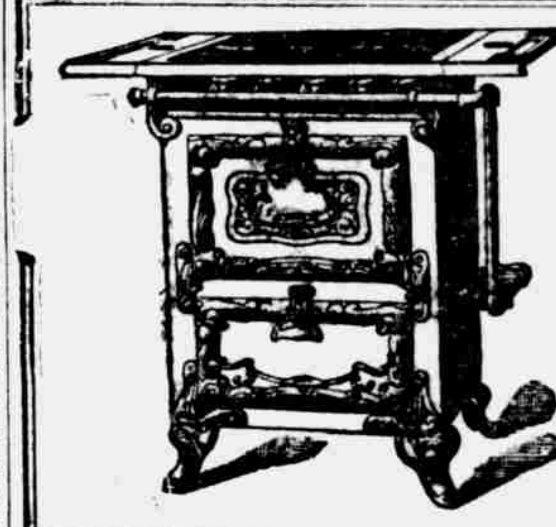
