RECEPTION FOR TOWNSEND

ARE AFTER JUSTICE
FOR THE VETERANS

It is claimed that several of them are not being given a square deal.

PUT AT A DISADVANTAGE.

One of the men affected is Col. Selden A. Day, a native of Ohio, and once a resident of Richmond.

Washington, Oct. 24.—A bill is to be introduced at the coming session of congress the object of which is to give twenty-three civil war veteran officers of the regular army, who answered President Lincoln's first call for troops a square deal in the place of the otherwise rough one marked out for them by the laws of the land. It will authorize the president to promote each of them to the grade of brigadier general on the retired list. They went through the civil and Spanish wars and took part in all the Indian campaigns. Because the law requires that every officer reaching the age of 64 shall go upon the retired list, many of them were put on the retired list when they were on the eve of promotion.

Had they gone into the war just the day before Lee surrendered every one of them would now hold higher rank. If congress does not pass the bill to be offered, eighteen officers on the active list, who went into the army just before the close of the war and did not therefore suffer the hardships, will have higher rank than the older men who passed through the whole of the Titanic struggle.

The injustice that will be done these long service officers, the average age of whom exceeds 71 years, is made possible by the act of April 23, 1904, which provides that when an officer who served in the civil war is retired, he shall go up a step in official grade. That act was intended for their benefit but the possibility that now presents itself was not thought of. They reached the age of 64 before the slow promotions which prevailed right after the war, made it possible for them to come within halving distance of brigadier generalships. But the men who came in at the fag end of the civil war, being younger than the men who stood all the hardships of that great war, have all reached the grade of brigadier general or colonel, and when they go upon the retired list, they will go up a step and be away above the men who served longer and under harder conditions. The passage of the bill will give the officers, some of whom entered the army as early as 1855, an honor that comes or will come to all their comrades of the war between the states.

One of the twenty-three is Col. Selden A. Day, who, born at Chillicothe, O., spent his boyhood and young manhood days in Chillicothe, Urbana and Richmond, Ind. He is one of those who tried to get into the army in response to the first call but failed, through no fault of his own, but simply because there were too many ahead of him. He raised a company at Bowling Green, O., doing it in the short time between April 17, the day he heard the call, and April 25. But his company could not be taken, so in June he enlisted in company B of the Seventh Ohio infantry, one of the crack organizations from the Buckeye state. From that time to July 22, 1902 he was continuously in the service and quit only because the law said he must, being 64 years old.

At the close of the civil war, 3036 officers who had participated in it, held commissions in the regular army. Of these officers, there are alive and on the retired list of the army, 138 who went through the whole war. In addition, there are 18 officers, still on the active list, who served in the civil war but only for comparatively short periods. Of the 138 15 are generals, leaving the 25 remaining below that grade. Of the 18 on the active list, nine of them are generals and the other nine will become generals when they retire, thus giving them honor, through the operation of a law intended to benefit them, denied to the men of much longer and harder service. And that is not a square deal from any point of view. They served each of them, from 45 to 51 years, including the whole war and by every rule of justice and equity, they should have equal, if not superior standing, to those who served less than the whole time of the civil war. They are all old men and unless the bill is passed this winter, some of them will carry the injustice of their country to the grave.

Col. H. R. Brinkerhoff, born near Tiffin, is another Ohio officer who would be benefitted by the passage of the bill.

Divers work as diamond diggers in South Africa. They work in icy cold water and black darkness. About three and a half miles down the river from Klerksdorp wire rope is stretched across the Vaal river from the Transvaal to the Orange river colony side, by means of which a large scow is placed in midstream, where the divers descend and work in from forty-eight to fifty-two feet of water. At present they have no light and work for three or four hours in cold water and intense darkness. All they are able to do at present is to grope around, move the big boulders with crowbars and scrape up the smaller stuff from the bed of the river, emptying it into a large wire drum which takes about a half hour to fill.
