GAMES WILL BE SCHEDULED

AND SOME OTHER PLACES.

Fountain City expects to take into camp about every other basketball team in Indiana this year. The team has organized for the coming season and practice will be in order from this time until the season begins. Games will be scheduled with strong teams of Indiana and Ohio, many of them to be played at Fountain City.

According to the statements of a Fountain City fan, the team will not be as strong as last year, as Scarce, the crack little forward who electrified Richmond audiences on several occasions, has accepted a position in Muncie as ticket agent for the Indiana Union traction line, and will therefore be unable to play. Hunt of Whitewater generally conceded to be a very good pivot man, will not be seen with Fountain City this year, as he is a salaried man and the manager of the north county team hopes to break away from the team of paid players.

The team will be strong however, with Harry Strong at forward, Louis Reynolds at center, Emmett Drury at forward and Roy Lacy and Russell Wright at guard positions. Harry Clark and Ray Swain are two candidates who are very promising.

An attempt will be made to arrange games with various Richmondites as well as with Farmland, Parker City, Winchester and other surrounding towns.

The statement was that the first touchdown made by De Pauw resulted from a fumble by Hancock. DONLIN GOT CHANCE
TO STRAIGHTEN UP

Authorities Agree to Let Him
Have Opportunity to
Quit Boozing.

HE HAS AGREED TO DO SO.

DONLIN HAS BEEN ARRESTED
FIVE TIMES RECENTLY AND
HAS SERVED 146 DAYS IN THE
COUNTY JAIL.

Despite the fact that John Donlin has served nearly five months of the past eight months in the county jail on charges of intoxication and was arrested again on Tuesday on the same charge, he will be given a chance to reform and make a man of himself. Before Judge Converse allowed Donlin his liberty, Donlin was obliged to swear in the presence of witnesses that he would not take another drink of booze for two years. If he breaks this oath Donlin will be given the maximum jail sentence for intoxication which is \$100 and costs and thirty days in jail, making the total sentence one hundred and forty days.

When Donlin was brought before Judge Converse and Prosecutor Jessup, the prosecutor asked him if he realized the fact that during the past 241 days he had served 146 days in the county jail, and that during this time it had cost the county \$58.40 to care for him. John said that he realized the fact.

Arrested Five Times.
The prosecutor then informed John that the past 241 days he had been arrested five times on charges of intoxication. The first time he was sent down for eleven days, the second time fifteen days, the third time twenty days, the fourth time thirty-five days and the fifth time sixty-five days. "And here you are again, charged with the same offense," stated the prosecutor. He then told Donlin that he was going to recommend to the court that he either be given the maximum jail sentence or be sent to the county infirmary.
