GOOD FOOTBALL TO BE SEEN THURSDAY IS GREAT INTEREST IN ROLLER SKATING

Much Is Expected of the Earham-Butler Game at Indianapolis.

Craze Takes the Country Much Like It Did Twenty Years Ago.

Indianapolis, Nov. 26.—Good football is promised Indianapolis lovers of the game for Thanksgiving afternoon, when Butler and Earham meet at Washington Park. This has always been a great football city on turkey day, and many will undoubtedly turn out to see the Irvington boys perform. Coach McKay, who has done well with the material he has had, is working like a Trojan, and expects to send a better team against the Quakers than faced them at Richmond two weeks ago.

Improvement is being made in the back field, there being plenty of candidates for positions. The two Barnes, McKay, Schmidt, Wallace and others are working hard for places. Captain Maguire hopes to start the game at quarter, although his injured shoulder has not yet healed. Fitzgerald will sub for the captain. The line is being bolstered rapidly and effectively. The men who were injured in the Quaker game have recovered and are back working for their places again. New men have helped out wonderfully, and the old ones are having a hard time regaining their positions.

Earham, however, has also improved since playing Butler. The Quakers were hit pretty hard by DePauw a week ago and the defeat hurt. But their ability to recover quickly was shown in Saturday's game against Wisconsin Tech, which was beaten 54 to 0. Coach Vall will have some new plays for his men, and as they are big enough to make almost any kind of a play, Butler's task is cut out for her. A hard-fought contest is assured.

SHATTERS THE MONEY STRINGENCY ENTIRELY

One Good Result of the Football Games.

YALE RECEIPTS ARE BIG.

New Haven, Conn., Nov. 26.—It is announced that the football receipts for the season for Yale will reach approximately \$80,000. While this is not a record-breaking amount it is unusually high. Yale and Harvard shared equally \$68,000 after Saturday's game, and the receipts of the Yale Princeton game, also split evenly between the teams, amounted to \$66,000. The sums spent in the city by visitors to the game Saturday and the enormous amounts won by Yale students on the game will completely break the money stringency in New Haven.

A great wave of interest in roller skating is sweeping over the entire country, and skating is likely very soon to become as popular as it was in the former exciting period 20 years ago. From present indications the coming winter will witness the greatest revival of roller skating since 1885 and from the amount of money being invested in the rink business, it is apparently on a more substantial and permanent basis than ever before.

All the old rinks are being reopened to immense attendance and many new ones have been built during the past summer and fall and others are being rapidly completed to open before the holidays. Some of these new rinks are very fine buildings, among others the "Genesee rink," Rochester, N. Y., cost \$150,000, capacity 2000 skaters; the "Coliseum," Kansas City, Mo., capacity 1500; "Castro," Baltimore, Md., skating floor space 80x250; the "Stadium," Montreal, Canada, floor space 75x250. There are at least 12 rinks in New York City and the "Metropolitan" and "Lenox Lyceum" are very large ones. Twenty-five rinks have opened or will open within 50 miles of Pittsburgh. These facts show the excitement developing in roller skating matters.

The craze has struck this city hard, and the directors of the Richmond Athletic association realizing the existing conditions and impressed with the importance of pleasing their patrons and getting ready for the increased business, decided at their last meeting to put in about 400 pair of Henley's latest up-to-date roller skates, bright fluted, ball bearing, all fitted with finest grade red fibre rollers, and therefore when the coliseum opens Thanksgiving eve, it will be with a splendid new equipment of skates and everything in perfect order to care for the big crowds which are sure to be in attendance during the season.

NOTRE DAME SHARES THE STATE HONORS

They Are Divided With Indiana University.

RESULTS ARE A SURPRISE.

Notre Dame, Ind., Nov. 26.—The outcome of the Purdue-Notre-Dame contest at Lafayette, last Saturday, has more than pleased the local followers, who would have been satisfied with a 5-to-0 score. The result of the game completely upset the dope that was figured here, the rooters, and especially the coaches, expecting a close game. It was a glorious finish to the march for state championship honors the Notre Dame eleven began when they fought Indiana to a tie game. The results of the season's battles were entirely unexpected at the beginning of the year, when hardly two teams reported for daily practice, and the men who showed up were for the most part inexperienced.

BEATING TWO CENT RATE ALL TO DEATH

Tramp Travels From New York to Indianapolis and Back Here on \$1.25.

IS A REAL ARISTOCRAT.

WHEN ASKED HIS NAME AT POLICE HEADQUARTERS, HE ASTONISHED THE OFFICERS BY HANDING OUT A CARD.

"I am sorry—no, I mean I am glad to leave you," answered an aristocrat and decidedly young hobo, to the police, as he began to fill the orders given him by Chief Bailey, that of getting over the Ohio state line about as fast as possible.

His name was Hyman Greenspan, and the youngster said his home was in Jamaica, Long Island. He was unceremoniously yanked off the front of the baggage car attached to train No. 10, running between Indianapolis and New York, by Patrolman McNally. He remained in the city jail until his case was investigated by the police.

The lad was dirty and unkempt. He said he was sixteen years of age and had started from New York several weeks ago with \$2 in his pocket with the intention of going to Indianapolis to work. He went there but could not find work and decided that dear old ma was good enough for him.

When he was pulled from the train in which he was beating his way back to New York, he was searched and this disclosed 75 cents. Greenspan admitted that he had gone from New York to Indianapolis and from Indianapolis back as far as Richmond on 125. The youngster was almost as typical Bowery lad as the one who was cared for some few days ago and he is now cracking stone at the county jail. Bailey told Greenspan that if he did not get out of town within a short time he would make him crack rocks for sixty days, at which warning he youngster smiled broadly.

With all his dirt and raggedness, the lad carried himself well and when asked his name, he handed out his card. It was poorly printed, but nevertheless it created somewhat of a surprise. Through this he was given the cognomen, "The Aristocratic Tramp."
