

INDIANA TO JOIN THE OTHER STATES

Manufacturers and Shippers
Decide on Effort to Rem-
edy Grievances.

SHIPPING FACILITIES SHORT

STATE ASSOCIATION HELD A SES-
SION AT INDIANAPOLIS AND
TOOK ACTION—W. J. WOOD DE-
LIVERED AN ADDRESS.

Indianapolis, Nov. 27.—The manu-
facturers and shippers of Indiana who
feel they have grievances against the
railroads of the country on account of
the meagre shipping facilities will join
with the manufacturers and shippers
of other states in forming a national
association, with a view to procuring
the enactment of legislation at Wash-
ington that will bring about a better un-
derstanding between their organiza-
tions with which they have to deal.

A strong sentiment in this direction
cropped out in the meeting of the In-
diana Manufacturers and Shippers' as-
sociation, which was held yesterday.
Instructions were given to Secretary
Zartman to at once open correspondence
with other state associations along
this line.

W. J. Wood, member of the Indiana
Railroad commission, read a paper be-
fore the association in which he said
that the transportation facilities of
this country have always been inade-
quate. He said that the electric power
applied to transportation will not
afford the desired remedy. "We must
get away from theories," he said, "and
back to what we really have. So far
as now indicated electric traction can
not be made at present to show suffi-
cient economy over steam in trunk line
service to justify its wholesale intro-
duction."

Speaking of the facilities of the
steam railroads for meeting the de-
mands of the shippers, Commissioner
Wood said: "The carriers claim that
if they were to attempt to furnish cars
and engines when all the shippers de-
mand carriage, they would have to ex-
pend large amounts of money for fac-
ilities that at other seasons would not
be needed. Hence, it appears that for
this reason, and also because capital is
not available and also for the reason
a few railroads are managed for specu-
lation and not for legitimate carry-
ing business, it is not possible now to
make the improvements and furnish
the facilities that your business de-
mands."

STREET CAR STRIKE ENDS

Strikers at Louisville Could
Not Win Fight.

WILL BE RE-EMPLOYED.

Louisville, Ky., Nov. 27.—The strike
of 750 union employees of the Louis-
ville Railway company was called off
by a vote taken by the men last night.
The men made no conditions, ac-
knowledging themselves beaten, but
the officials of the company announced
that they will employ the strikers
who apply as individuals and who
have not been implicated in acts of
violence during the strike.

The strike lasted twelve days and
was marked by two serious collisions
between large crowds of sympathizers
and the police, aside from smaller af-
fairs. The number of persons injured
as a result of these clashes is estimat-
ed at thirty and the number of arrests
made totals 100.

The strike was caused by friction
over the interpretation of an agree-
ment signed after the first strike,
which occurred last April.

ORDER OF OWLS SPREADS

A State Organization Has
Been Effectuated.

Probably the next secret order that
will make its way into Richmond is
the Order of Owls, which is being
organized in a number of places and a
state body of which has just been
formed.

Anderson Nest, Order of Owls, was
organized at Anderson, recently, with
a membership of about seventy, the
Indianapolis and Muncie lodges per-
forming the work. After the institution
of the new nest the work of per-
fecting the state organization was taken
up and officers were elected.
