HOW OLD IS ANN? A SIMPLE PROBLEM

It Seems So When Compared
To the Momentous Ques-
tion of Riding a Cavalry
Horse.

PRESIDENT DISCUSSES QUESTION WITH TAFT.

One Officer in the Service
Cannot Ride Because He
Weighs More Than Three
Hundred Pounds.

Washington, Jan. 4.—President Roosevelt and Secretary Taft this evening devoted considerable time considering the question as to what course shall be followed regarding army officers who failed to make good in the recent horseback riding test by special order of the president. It is known that several young officers in charge of river and harbor and other public works necessarily will be placed on the retired list should the report of the riding board be followed. Among this number is Col. Marshall, in charge of the Ambrose channel improvement in New York, who failed to ride because no horse could be found heavy enough to carry him. Col. Marshall weighs 250 pounds and the advice of the army physicians was that if he mounted a horse it probably would fall and result in the injury of the officer.

At the conclusion of the conference Secretary Taft said he had no announcement to make tonight regarding the matter under consideration, because no decision had been reached. The secretary said he would again see the president tomorrow and that a definite announcement would probably be made at the conclusion of the cabinet meeting.

Entered Into Suicide Pact.

Chicago, Jan. 4.—Charles G. Brockett, thirty-eight years old, employed as a floorwalker in a State street store, and Mrs. Ruby Pishak, wife of a state bank examiner, were found unconscious from bullet wounds in Grant park in front of the Auditorium Annex last night. Notes found in Brockett's clothing showed that the shooting was in pursuance of a suicide pact. Brockett died a few minutes after having been taken to a hospital. Mrs. Pishak was shot above the heart and is in a critical condition. Brockett came to Chicago from San Francisco a few months ago.

The Powers Jury.

Georgetown, Ky., Jan. 4.—From the only questions which the jury has propounded to the court it is evident that the discussion which has prolonged their deliberations in the Powers case has been along the lines of Henry E. Youtsey's conviction directly or indirectly with the shooting of Goebel. Youtsey's testimony implicated himself and Powers as well.

Cutting Down Expenses.

Lisbon, Jan. 4.—Premier Franco, during the first half of the fiscal year, has effected a saving of \$3,550,000 as compared with the expenditures during the like period for last year under the previous administration.

TRACTION RIGHTS MAY BE REVOKED

Residents of New Paris Are
Indignant Over Change
Of Schedule.

ONE HOUR TO RICHMOND.

IT TAKES JUST TWO HOURS TO
MAKE THE ROUND TRIP BE-
TWEEN THE TWO POINTS AND
ACTION MAY BE TAKEN.

The Terre Haute, Indianapolis & Eastern traction company seems to have stirred up a hornets nest, when it did away with the old running schedule between this city and New Paris, placing a schedule into effect which greatly discommodes residents living in the Ohio town, particularly when they desire to come to Richmond. As matters stand at present, it seems as though the residents of New Paris are considering seriously the idea of revoking the traction franchise, unless officials of the public service corporation does something in the near future to remedy existing evil conditions. A dispatch from New Paris says of the present schedule, the feeling toward the traction line and the action that will probably follow:

"The howl in protest against the new service of the interurban line continues to increase in volume. It now requires an hour or more to make the trip to Richmond and the same to return. There has been talk of calling a special meeting of council to give formal notice of a revocation of the franchise, because of the violation of its terms. The council of course, has no jurisdiction outside of the corporation limits, but the franchise was granted upon the express agreement that cars should be run to Richmond without transfer at intervals not greater than two hours. This was done for a time, when the half hourly service with transfer at Westville was inaugurated. This was satisfactory and no protest was made, but when the present schedule was adopted, this has been found very unsatisfactory and the protests will doubtless continue to be increasingly urgent. The business of the road has fallen off considerably since the change was made, many now patronizing the steam road in order to avoid the annoying wait at Westville."

"We use the low pressure system in this plant," explained the engineer. "That is, we use the steam over and over again."

"I see," said the visitor. "It's something like the system of ventilation in the sleeping cars."—Chicago Trib-
une.

Ticket Agent Misappropriated
The Funds of Railway
Corporation.

CLIMAX OF A GAY CAREER.

CHARTERED SPECIAL CAR AND
MADE A MERRY TRIP TO CHI-
CAGO—CONDUCTING INVESTI-
GATION OF HIS BOOKS.

Fort Wayne, Ind., Jan. 4.—J. F. Wilson, formerly of Indianapolis, but who for a year has been ticket agent for the Fort Wayne & Wabash Valley railroad, is a fugitive, with the charge of misappropriating company funds hanging over him. A year ago he quit dissipated habits and made himself popular with and trusted by the company officials. He fell from grace on a special trip to Huntington, and on returning he suddenly quit the office and began a round of dissipation, ending in chartering a special car, costing him \$106, with which, with companions, he went to Kalamazoo and from thence to Chicago, where he disappeared. He leaves a wife and children here in destitute circumstances. The auditors of the company are checking up his accounts to ascertain his exact shortage. They are inclined to believe it will not exceed two days' receipts, which can be covered by his bond, much regret is expressed over his downfall, as he was popular and efficient.

WITTE'S ACTS NOW UNDER FIRE

His Record of Methods Not in
Favor.

St. Petersburg, Jan. 4.—The controversy between Count Witte and Gen. Kuropatkin over Kuropatkin's testimony at the trial of Gen. Stoessel, which has been conducted at length for several days in the Novoe Vremya, has developed into a discussion of Count Witte's role of so-called Eastern adventure and the extent of his responsibility for the war. This the enemies of Count Witte have persistently endeavored to saddle upon him. Gen. Kuropatkin, in a series of letters, has sought to prove that Witte was responsible for the foundation of Port Dainy, which the general declares gave the Japanese an invaluable base during the siege of Port Arthur, and also interfered with the dispatch of heavy artillery to the fortress.

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
