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GOVERNOR DURBIN
MAKES A DENIAL

Says He Was Not a Go-Between for McCullough and Crawford Fairbanks.

FALSE STATEMENTS MADE.

SAYS HE HAD NOTHING TO DO
WHATEVER WITH ANDERSON
SQUABBLE AND STARTLING
REVELATIONS MADE.

Indiana, Ind., Jan. 1.—Ex-Governor Winfield T. Durbin has issued a public statement denying the charges made by Sparks L. Ullock, ex-chairman of the Democratic Committee of Madison county, that he acted as a go-between in negotiations between his brother-in-law, C. R. McCullough and Crawford Fairbanks, the Terre Haute brewer, by which Lew Ellingsham, Decatur received the Madison county vote for Eighth district chairman. It was charged that a deal was completed at Anderson last Friday night by which McCullough was to have Fairbanks's support for governor if Ellingsham was elected. Colonel Durbin practically gave the lie to Brooks by saying that if the interview purporting to come from him is correct, that he has wilfully made malicious and false statements. He declared that he has not talked with Crawford Fairbanks for several months and that there was no deal as he knows or was concerned. Colonel Durbin said that his stand on the liquor question was made clear in his last message to the legislature.

TELEGRAPHIC TIPS

Affairs of World Wide Interest Told in Short Paragraphs.

MUCH NEWS OF INTEREST.

By stipulation the Goldfield injunction case has been continued until Jan. 10.

Edward Hanlon, ex-champion oarsman of the world, is dead at Toronto from pneumonia.

Business failures for the week number 345, against 248 last week, 185 in the same week of 1907, and 220 in 1906.

Favorable weather for harvesting in Argentina and a decline in corn caused weakness in the Chicago wheat market.

Secretary Hester's statement of the world's visible supply of cotton shows a total of 4,800,736, against 4,727,542 last week.

Zero weather has prevailed throughout Germany since the beginning of the new year and has resulted in much delay to traffic.

New issues of stocks and bonds in Germany in 1907 amounted to only \$460,500,000, as compared with \$702,500,000 in 1906.

Former Governor Horace Boies of Iowa, is critically ill of pneumonia at Providence hospital, El Paso. He was on the way to California.

Evelyn Nesbit, Did Not Call.

Mrs. Thaw's chauffeur went to the prison yesterday morning with a note that Mrs. Thaw would call later in the afternoon. But she did not. She is still a sufferer from a cold, it was said.

Thaw's trial has been set down for 9:30 o'clock Monday morning. It is doubtful whether the first talesman will be called before noon. Justice Dowling must first deliver a charge to the special grand jury which will hear all the evidence in the various cases which the attorney general has referred to Mr. Jerome. Neither Mr. Jerome nor Mr. Littleton has been able to estimate how long it will take to fill the jury box. It might occupy two weeks. It has been decided to lock the jury up from the time they are sworn in. Mr. Garvan will assist Mr. Jerome in the prosecution of Thaw. It is because the jurors are to be locked up so long that difficulty in filling the jury box is anticipated.

The president has signed a proclamation creating the Verde national forest in Arizona, with an area of 721,580 acres, located in Maricopa and Yavapai counties.

Waiting for His Second Trial in Dread, as Loved Ones Will Be Separated From Him



Thaw is Restless in His Prison Cell, as He Knows His Counsel Alone Will Be With Him.

Second Hearing of Famous Case Will Begin Monday Morning When Jurors Will Be Examined—Evelyn to Tell the Sad Story of Her Anguish and Ruin.

New York, Jan. 4.—Harry K. Thaw is in dread of his second trial for slaying Stanford White, because he will be without the cheering presence of his loyal wife and devoted mother as he sits in the court room and because his favorite sister, the Countess of Yarmouth, will not come to this country for the trial.

Under the new arrangement of the courtroom the wife and the mother will be kept 12 feet away from the defendant. At his first trial they were constantly with him and their love and words of hope did much to cheer him during his ordeal. He faces the second trial with the knowledge that he will have only his counsel near him.

Thaw will be within a brass railing at the second trial, while his wife, his mother, his sister, Mrs. Carnegie, and his brothers must remain outside. A passageway has been built around the wall of the room so that the prisoner will at no time pass his family.

There has been a rumor for some time that in case of a second disagreement, the same procedure will be followed as in the cases of Nan Patterson and Dr. Kennedy. Both of these prisoners were allowed to go free under a suspended sentence, after the two juries had failed to convict them.

Much New Testimony.

The defense will offer much new testimony—testimony that was not brought out at the first trial. There will be a score of new eyewitnesses to the shooting of White, and all will testify that in their opinion Thaw was insane on the night of the murder. Mrs. Evelyn Thaw will again, in moulton words of anguish, tell of her ruin at the hands of the arch betrayer, Stanford White.

Mr. Littleton has a list of the three hundred talesmen who have been summoned to appear Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday in the criminal branch of the supreme court and detectives are investigating the record of each. This is done in every important murder case by the defense as well as by the district attorney.

Mr. O'Reilly and Mr. Peabody called at the Tombs early yesterday to see Thaw. They consulted with him in the counsel room on the second tier of the Tombs prison. Thaw was glad to see Mr. O'Reilly again. The lawyer has just recovered from an attack of bronchitis. Mr. O'Reilly said that his father wasn't as wise as your mother, although he thought he was. You take after your father in the matter of wisdom. Often since those days you have involuntarily taken off your hat and wished you could ever hope to have half as much horse sense as either of your parents.

"You're born about three and a half years before you remember, and at times since then you have regretted it. At other times you have wished you had been born twins. This wish has come oftener when your digestion was good and you had just finished Thanksgiving dinner. Your mother was a good woman and a wise one, though you didn't always recognize her wisdom. You had spells of feeling much discouraged over the fact that you didn't have both your parents under better discipline.

"Your wife would have been unduly grateful if you had been more constant to your promise to remain single. If you hadn't married such a good woman you would have been better mated. But I wouldn't dare tell your wife this.

"I see a dark room. There are clothes hanging on chairs and bedposts. Some one is going through your pockets. It is your wife. Too bad she doesn't get more out of them. The 50 cents you gave her week before last must be almost exhausted.

"You have been lied to a great deal your lifetime. Almost everybody told you they would vote for you. Almost everybody in all probability didn't—am I right? Thanks.

"There is a man or two in different parts of the country, that you would a great deal rather not meet, on account of your inability to explain satisfactorily certain things you have done or said. There is also a woman or two of whom the same is true. You were once placed in a position where in order not to wreck some one's happiness—Ah! I see, it was your own happiness that was most jeopardized—you told a deliberate falsehood that immediately made necessary some others. Ah! I see you don't like to be reminded of it."

"At this stage I should tell the man that if he would pay me a dollar more I would tell him about the future and give him some much needed advice as to his business affairs, he being, as a matter of course, engaged in some line of work that was not entirely fitted to the taste and proclivities or along the line of his peculiar and very considerable ability. And I should get the other dollar if he had it with him.
