Alleged That the Old-Tim
Cromer-McCullough Feud I
Behind the Scenes of Riot
ous Demonstration.

SITUATION IS RAPIDLY
IMPROVING UNDER GUARD

Traction Company Scouts Ar-
bitration Proposal at Ander-
son and Absolutely Refuses
To Resort To This.

Indianapolis, Ind., Jan. 6. The Muncie strike situation has taken a new angle since it was learned that Governor Hanly called in ex-Congressman George W. Cromer to discuss several reports that have come to him. The governor and Cromer were together for some time, but they refused to reveal the nature of their conversation. Governor Hanly intimated very plainly that it was not a matter for publication.

During the last 24 hours, rumors have reached the governor from seemingly reliable sources that the old-time political feud that lost the republicans the Eighth district last year, has had much to do with the trouble at Muncie and that certain party workers were still doing everything they could secretly to prevent a settlement of the differences between the strikers and the traction company.

One of the controlling spirits of the latter is George McCullough, between whom and Cromer there has long existed one of the bitterest feuds in the history of the state. Cromer is said to be a power among the union laborers of Muncie, who have helped him defeat his enemies many times.

Muncie, Ind., Jan. 7.—For the first time since last Tuesday night the city street cars offered service to the public regularly after dark last night, and the trips were made without attack except in a single instance. On the West Side line, where a car was derailed and demolished yesterday, stones were hurled at a car at 9 o'clock, the assailants throwing them from behind a church.

Adjutant General McKee remains at his headquarters at the Delaware Hotel and the 12 companies of militia are quietly sleeping on arms in their different barracks throughout the city, but not a single soldier has yet done one moment's active duty, the mildest form of martial law being still in vogue.

GIVEN FLAT REFUSAL

Of the Indiana Traction Company to Arbitrate at Anderson.

Anderson, Ind., Jan. 7. In its reply to a citizen's committee and made public at a mass meeting yesterday afternoon, the Indiana Union Traction flatly and finally refused to submit to arbitration with the Amalgamated Association of Street and Electric Railway Employees of America as a means of ending a strike by motormen and conductors on the local or city lines.

HUSBAND CHARGED WITH COLD MURDER

Police Believe That Two Men
Were Implicated in the
New Jersey Murder.

CLAIMED TO HAVE HAD DATE

Newark, N. J., Jan. 7.—Evidence unearthed in the case of Helena Whitmore, whose body was found in the Lamp Black pond near Harrison, N. J., leads the police to day to the belief that two men were involved in the murder of the woman, and that one of the men had a perfect knowledge of the lonely neighborhood where the body was found. Theodore Whitmore, husband of the swamp victim, was under a severe examination all day Monday and, although frequently giving away to crying spells, he stoutly maintained that he knew nothing of his wife's murder.

The Brooklyn detectives closely questioned Harry Hendrickson, who is held as a witness in the case. He declares that he had an engagement with Mrs. Whitmore on Christmas night, but failed to keep it.

After a long examination of the husband of the murdered woman Judge Braden last night announced that Whitmore would be formally arraigned in court today and formally charged with murder.

TOBACCO WAR AT A CRUCIAL POINT

Attorney General Threatened
By Desperado's Friends.

Hopkinsville, Ky., Jan. 7.—The fight between the tobacco growers' associations and the American Tobacco company, has reached its crisis. In Kentucky and Tennessee, and the failure of the recent meeting, held at the place of Gov. Wilson, is expected to be followed by more "night rider" outrages.

Washington, D. C., Jan. 7.—The new \$2,000,000 office building erected by the government for the members of the house is practically completed. The 257 rooms are free to congressmen, who heretofore have had to pay out of their own pockets for private offices. Quarters in the new building will be assigned this week by lottery. A subway, to be equipped with a miniature railway for rapid transit, connects the new building with the capitol.
