

YOUTH OF NINETEEN STEALS A WOMAN OF TWENTY-SEVEN

Peoples Meets His Sweetheart
On Streets of Anderson and
Forcibly Puts Her on Train
And Comes to Richmond.

ALIGHTED IN ARMS OF MINION OF LAW.

He Was Released and His
Pretty Sweetheart For-
warded Back to Her Home
In Anderson.

Dan Peoples, 19 years of age, was arrested at the local Pennsylvania station last night for stealing Della Sills, aged 27 years. Both are residents of Anderson. The Sills woman, small and quite pretty, was taken with Peoples to police headquarters. After Chief Bailey had thoroughly questioned both of them he reached the conclusion that he had no authority to detain Peoples on a charge of abduction so he was released. The Sills woman was sent back to Anderson. This made her very happy as she stated she is madly in love with her and the young woman said, had several times in a jealous rage threatened to kill her.

The woman in the case was formerly a respected and popular young woman. She became acquainted with people of bad character and her downfall resulted. A short time ago young Peoples met her and immediately lost his heart. About seven weeks ago the young man ran off with the Sills woman. She furnished the funds for traveling expenses by pawning her watch and diamonds for \$200. A few days ago Miss Sills tired of her lover and returned to Anderson. Yesterday morning she was walking with another woman on one of the principal streets of that city when Peoples approached, seized her by the arm and forced her to accompany him to the Pennsylvania station.

Peoples bought a ticket for her and himself to Richmond. On the train she confided to the conductor that Peoples was taking her away from Anderson against her will and the conductor telegraphed to the local police headquarters to have a man meet the train at Richmond and take Peoples in custody. This was done. Before leaving police headquarters the youngster said that he would leave the Sills woman alone in the future and would seek employment in this city.

PART OF THIRD WARD MAY BE PUT IN DRY COLUMN

Petition Is Being Circulated
With Some Opposition to
Place Northern Half in Tem-
perance Rank.

REMONSTRANCE AGAINST DRYNESS SIGNED BY MANY

Residents in Northern Portion
Desire Entire Ward to Be
Made Dry If Any One Section
Is Acted Against.

A petition to have the north half of the third ward made a residence portion is being circulated, and the petition is receiving active opposition. It is stated that a little over one hundred people have signed the petition, while the remonstrance against it bears over two hundred signatures. A short time ago the North End Mission decided to start a movement with the end in view of drying out the two saloons in that part of the third ward north of the railroad tracks. The north half of the third ward extends from the river to North Twelfth street. The two saloons are those of Henry Leonard and Henry Schell.

It was expected that the petition to have the northern section of the third ward declared a resident portion of the city would be presented to council last evening, but for some unknown reason this action was not taken. Attorney Henry C. Johnson represents the remonstrators and he was present at the council meeting to file the remonstrance in case the petition was introduced.

Henry Williams who has taken an active part in fighting the petition, states that the reason more people have signed the remonstrance than the petition is because the greater majority of the residents of the north half of the third ward oppose having that section made "dry" unless the entire ward goes "dry."

HOME OF FRIENDLESS IN EXISTENCE MORE THAN FORTY YEARS

Annual Report of the Secre-
tary, Mrs. Taylor, Has Just
Been Prepared and It Con-
tains Much of Interest.

LONG JAIL RECORD OF ONE LOCAL WOMAN

During the Year She Spent
Two Hundred and Twenty-
Five Days Behind Prison
Bars at the Home.

Mrs. A. M. Taylor, recording secretary for the Home of the Friendless has prepared the following very interesting report on the condition of the home at the present, also touching upon affairs at the home during the year 1907. The report follows:

"This is the 49th anniversary of the organization of the home. For a season we lived in rented quarters, moving into the present building in 1869. Since that feeble beginning the Home has advanced greatly and many improvements have been made. In that early period the board of managers had to go out and solicit for daily sustenance. We must never forget the heroism of the early managers of the institution. With our modern improvements of electric lights, telephone, bath and modern system of heating, we can hardly estimate the almost superhuman efforts of those loyal women, many of whom have gone to their reward. During the past year the new hall has been completed, which gives us more room, but both old and new halls have been full the past month. The hall is in good order, but the lawn and fences both front and rear need some attention as soon as spring opens. The first of August Mrs. Margaret Spencer, a former matron and well known to some of you, returned to once more take up the duties of the matron. We feel that her influence over the inmates, is that of a wise and judicious mother, firm but gentle and sympathetic.

We were bountifully remembered by our friends on annual donation day, and at the holidays, which were especially happy times for the children. They had a tree electric lighted and full of gifts. To see their happy faces, more than repaid us for our toil. All, including the prisoners, received gifts. At the beginning of 1907 we had 2 insane, 2 old ladies, 1 invalid, 1 young girl for care, and a four year old boy for care. We have received during the year, 8 insane, 4 transients, 23 prisoners (one woman has spent at different sentences 225 days in jail in the past year). We have received 2 unfortunate girls, 3 sick women for care and 10 juveniles. We have released 22 prisoners, 4 transients, 5 insane, 2 girls, 1 old lady who was taken to the hospital and died there. There was one birth and no deaths. We have at the present time the invalid girl, the girl border, one unfortunate girl, 1 sick woman for care, 1 old lady and 5 children in the Home department. In the jail we have 3 insane and four other prisoners, one of whom will be there till August unless her fine is paid. Religious services are held in the rooms of the inmates and morning services at the table. Whenever there are those who are able to attend service in the chapel, services are held there. We take this opportunity to thank the press and the public for their many kindnesses to the institution. In the words of Lyman Abbott D. D. "We are not writing in the sand. The tide does not wash it out. We are not painting our pictures on the canvas, and with a brush so that we can erase the error of yesterday, or overlap it with another color today. We are writing with a chisel on the marble, and everytime we strike a blow, we leave a mark that is indelible."

TARIFF REVISION WANTED BY SENATOR

Beveridge Claims That He Is
Still a Protectionist.
However.

BILL FOR A COMMISSION. PROVIDES THAT THIS SHALL GATHER DATA AND AID THE COMMITTEE IN CONGRESS IN WORK OF TARIFF REVISION.

Washington, Jan. 7.—Senator Beveridge today introduced a bill creating a commission to gather data and aid the committees of congress in the work of tariff revision. The bill provides for members of the commission which is to operate under the supervision of the secretary of commerce and labor. The duties of the commission will be to proceed immediately to investigate the cost of production of articles covered by the tariff laws, the price of American labor and the cost of new material entering into manufactured articles. The commission will sit with the committee on banking and currency of the house and the committee of finance of the senate whenever desired and aid them in devising schedules.

In discussing the bill Senator Beveridge says he remains an ardent protectionist, but believes there is a universal demand for the revision of the tariff schedules, which ought to take place as soon as the next presidential campaign is over. He maintains that it would be absolutely impossible for the committees of congress to undertake revision without the aid of a commission such as he will prescribe in his bill.

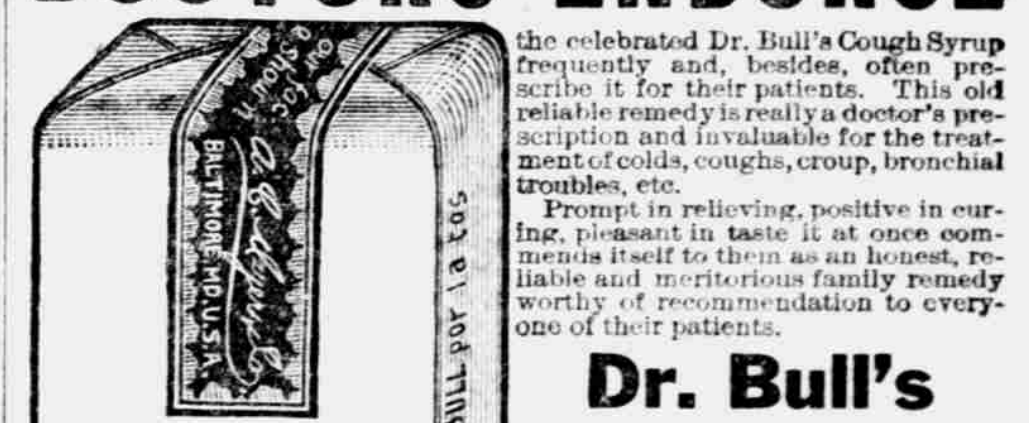

VICTIM OF LOVER'S BULLETS LEAD

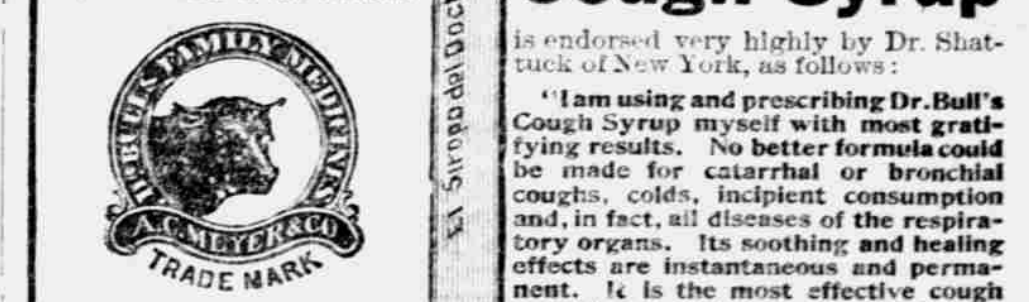
Miss Lena Craig Was Shot
