New York, Jan. 9.—Mrs. Howard Gould sat in Justice Tamm's supreme court and heard the husband she is suing for separation denounced as a "sybaritic satyr."

"This Howard Gould married Catherine Clemmons in the bloom of her youth and beauty," went on Mirabeau L. Towne, counsel for Mrs. Gould, who was being sued for a \$2,000 dress bill. "Then, in the fashion that seems to obtain among these young millionaires, he has subjected her to persecution first and then, like a sybaritic satyr, cast her off when some new face appealed to him. If he could, he'd divorce her in the court this morning."

"We shall prove to you that when this woman induced her to abandon her home," then he sets up this suit to tarnish the character of the woman he has sworn to cherish. He wanted to be free from her. What are we coming to, if any of these millionaires can cast off their wives as they please?"

The bill for the payment of which Mrs. Gould is being sued is owned by Malcolm Butler the plaintiff, to whom it was assigned by the Lichtenstein Millinery company, where Mrs. Gould bought the finery between November, 1906, and January, 1907.

The items in the bill on which suit was brought consisted of a sealskin coat worth \$675, a black caracul skirt worth \$700, a light blue cape for \$250, black caracul hat and muff at \$225 and an otter bon and muff at \$125.

ROCKEFELLER IS BEATEN IN SUIT

Cleveland Landlady Settles
With Oil Magnate.

Cleveland, O., January 8.—John D. Rockefeller, through his attorneys, who have been fighting a \$25,000 damage suit for two years, today gave notice in Common Pleas Court that he had agreed to a settlement with the plaintiff.

The case grew out of the erection of the big Rockefeller skyscraper here. In excavating for the building, the old Johnson House, now known as the Saunders Hotel, was damaged by the toppling of its wall, which had been supported for scores of years by the old Weddell House. Mrs. Martha Condee, owner, brought suit against Rockefeller for \$25,000 damages, alleging that it cost her \$23,000 to patch the wall and that other damage

ARMS LANDED IN HONDURAS?

Reports That Rifles and Muni-
tions of War Shipped In.

Puerto Cortez, Spanish Honduras, Jan. 4, via New Orleans, Jan. 9.—Following the wreck of the steamer Alps on Glover's reef December 24, the boat of an American that he had sold 6,000 rifles in Central America in two weeks and the report that General Leo Christmas was recruiting forces near Puerto Barrios, it was rumored that a vessel from New Orleans was landing arms and ammunition near here.

This report was conveyed to the commandant of the port here by the president of Honduras and resulted in Captain Maxwell, of the United States gunboat Marjatta making an investigation, which resulted in his finding the Alps foundered on Glover's reef. Captain Maxwell boarded the Alps and was satisfied that there were no arms on board and that none had been landed.
