## VENTURE INTO BANK COST HIM MILLION

Heinze Interest in Mercantile Institution Has Been Taken From Him.

GOULD INTERESTS ON TOP.

HAS PLEADED NOT GUILTY TO CHARGE OF MISAPPROPRIATION OF FUNDS AND CASE WILL BE HEARD JANUARY 20.

New York, Jan. 9.—At least \$1,000,000, and perhaps twice that, was lost from the fortune of F. Augustus Heinze yesterday when, practically resourceless and facing trial in the United States court for alleged misappropriation of Mercantile National bank funds, he was forced to relinquish his 2,000 shares of stock in that institution.

Edwin Gould and William Nelson Cromwell, original owners of the shares, took them over when Heinze admitted his inability to take up the notes he had given in part payment. That completely eliminated him from the Mercantile National bank. The Gould-Cromwell interests took their old place and will restore the bank to its former quiet, conservative standing.

The final ousting of Heinze took place only a few hours after he had appeared before Judge Chatfield in the United States circuit court on the charges of over certification of checks and misapplication of funds. He pleaded not guilty and his attorney was given until January 20 to prepare for trial. It was a sad sort of day for the erstwhile copper king.

## DIVIDES FARM LAND AMONG CHILDRE

Samuel Lambertson and Wife Of Near Cambridge City Make Big Gifts.

EACH CHILD GETS \$15,000

THE LAND HAS BEEN IN POSSESSION OF MR. LAMBERTSON FOR MORE THAN A HALF CENTURY.

Cambridge City, Ind., Jan. 9.—Recently Samuel Lambertson and wife Demaris, called all their children to the home place and gave each a substantial gift. They are blessed with a large and appreciative family of boys and girls and with the grandchildren; the house was full to overflowing. Mr. and Mrs. Lambertson were able to divide among their children about 800 acres, the best farming land of Ellettsville and Henry counties. The division makes a harmonious settlement of the property that Mr. Lambertson has accumulated by long years of labor and good business acumen and the assistance of his wife and children. While W. A. Medsker, an attorney for Mr. Lambertson, was making out papers for the distribution of the lands, he had deeds placed in his hands for lands that have been in Mr. Lambertson's possession for more than a half century. By this and previous gifts each child will have about \$15,000.

## TO THE FARMERS OF WAYNE COUNTY.

If the State of Indiana permits the Grocers and Dealers in neighboring towns of Richmond to sell Country Sausage, Meats, etc., Richmond cannot sustain an ordinance prohibiting her dealers from selling the same. Otherwise it would be class legislation. As far as I can use Country Sausage, Meats, etc., I will buy and sell them until a test case is made.

There are other City ordinances that are fencible in the City. If the Grocers, Milkmen and Wagon Dealers can sell from house to house during the market hours, the Farmer can sell his own product also. Otherwise it would be Class Legislation. I will be at the expense of the trial of the first Farmer that is arrested for selling his own products in the city during Market hours and make a test case of it. Years ago, I made a test case, by refusing to pay to the City Market Master for inspecting my Grocery Scales (after paying the third annual inspection), was fined in the City Court, the case was appealed to the Circuit Court, the City lost the case. Since then my scales have been inspected annually, but no fees asked. I understand the Market Master is still collecting his fees from other dealers. Groceriesmen, is this true? C. B. ## WESTERN WAYNE BREAKS HOG RECORD

Sixty Head Averaging More Than 386 Pounds Were Sold on the Market.

## OFF FARM OF JOHN JACKSON

Cambridge City, Ind., Jan. 9.—The finest lot of hogs that has been sold in this part of the state this season, came from the farm of John Jackson, in Washington township, and were delivered to Henry Hartman at Germantown. They comprised 60 head and the average weight was 386 pounds. This is good weight for aged hogs, but is all the more remarkable for the reason that these hogs were ten months and less in age. To be precise, 48 head were ten months old and 12 head were eight months old. Albert Sarver, who has charge of the farm, deserves much credit for his part of the work. These pigs came from pure bred Duroc sows, topped by a pure bred Poland China boar. The price of these hogs was \$4.50 and the weighing was done on the farm. Mr. Jackson has his farm in the best condition for grain and stock, and it isn't much trouble for a good farmer like Mr. Sarver to get results. Nothing has been spared to make the soil fertile, to keep good fences and barns, and have pure water wherever needed.

Ruth Sweeney, 16 years old, to whom Smith had become greatly attached, was sentenced Saturday to the Girls' Reformatory, and the worry over this fact caused the boy to take his life. He attempted to commit suicide about four weeks ago by the same method, but was saved by prompt medical attention.

Miss Moss declares that she had her wedding garments made two years ago on the promise of Hepler to marry her but that he fled to Buffalo. On hearing of the death of his father, and knowing Hepler would pass through Washington coming to the funeral, the young lady swore out the warrant last evening.

## The Ferocious Muskellunge.

In the bed of a drained off lake was found the skull of a muskellunge with a swan's skull inside of it, and the teeth were locked in the bone, showing that the strong, powerful bird had been attacked during a time when its head was under water, and possibly in the fierce battle that must have ensued each combatant drowned the other.
