**FIFTH DIAMOND HOUSE

MAY GO SCOT FREE**

Appellate Court Sets Aside the
Sentence Against Eugene
Schmitz.

EXTORTION HELD NO CRIME.

ABE REUF ALSO COMES UNDER
THE RAY OF HOPE HELD OUT
IN THE FAMOUS FRENCH RESTAURANT CASES.

San Francisco, Cal., Jan. 10.—The District Court of Appeals handed down a decision yesterday setting aside the judgment in the case of ex-Mayor Eugene E. Schmitz, convicted of extortion in the French restaurant case. Abe Reuf also benefits by the ruling of the upper court, for, according to its decision, he pleaded guilty to an act that was no offense against the laws of the state.

According to the Appellate judges the compelling of French restaurants to pay "reus" to Abe Reuf was not a crime, even though Reuf divided the fees with the mayor. After discussing the point the court reversed the judgment against Schmitz on the ground that no act constituting a crime had been proved against him. Abe Reuf, who pleaded guilty to extorting money from the French restaurants, therefore equally guiltless.

Must Stay in Jail.
Schmitz and Reuf can not take advantage of the decision for sixty days. The prosecution has twenty days in which to ask for a rehearing. Then the Appellate Court will have ten days to consider the application. When that is done the prosecution will go through the same procedure in the Supreme Court, which will take the same length of time. Consequently Schmitz and Reuf will still be kept in the county jail for two months at least.

WAS NEVER USED**

Cross Examination of Walsh
Fails to Shake His
Statements.

BONDS WERE IN BANKS.

AT THE TIME OF HIS SUSPEN-
SION, PAPERS WERE PLACED IN
NATIONAL BANKS AND ARE
WORTH PRICE PAID.

Chicago, Jan. 10. Cross examination of John R. Walsh by Assistant District Attorney Fletcher Dobyns, which was continued today failed to change in any material point the testimony given by the accused bank president. The matter covered was chiefly the dealings of the Equitable Trust company, an adjunct of the Chicago National bank, with the Bedford Quarries company, the Bedford Belt railroad and the Centralia and Chester railroad. The cross-examination will probably be completed today.

The interrogation reverted to Walsh's relations with C. M. Foreman receiver of the Centralia and Chester railroad, which were considered to some extent. Walsh denied the truth of the statement made by Foreman as a witness for the prosecution.

Mr. Walsh asserted that the few remaining bonds of the railroad and other companies which were in the Chicago National bank at the time of its suspension are now worth their purchase price. He was emphatic in denying that any of the proceeds of loans secured by bonds of the Wisconsin and Michigan railroad or of the syndicate headed by himself and J. M. Fairbairn had gone into his personal account.

Left Estate.

ASHVILLE, N. C., Jan. 10. The home mission board of the Presbyterian conference of the United States has declined to accept the country estate, "Beauchamp," offered as a gift by John A. Roebeling, multimillionaire, who is a son of Col. Washington Roebeling, of Brooklyn bridge fame.

Mr. Roebeling announced his intention of abandoning his estate here, which joins that of George W. Vanderbilt's Biltmore, and to leave Asheville because the town has gone dry. On account of his stand taken against prohibition he has been notified by the home board of missions that it regrets it can not accept his offer. Mr. Roebeling then made the same offer to the Episcopal church, which has been accepted by Bishop Horner, of the North Carolina mission board.
