

FORMATION OF OHIO LEAGUE TO BE CONSIDERED

Richmond Will Be Represented at the Meeting Which Will Be Held in Columbus, O., To Determine Organization.

BOBBY QUINN HAS NOT ACCEPTED PRESIDENCY.

It Is Practically Certain, However That the Crown Will Be Placed on the Manager of The Columbus A. A. Team.

Richmond will be represented at the meeting of the Ohio baseball owners, which will be held in Columbus, O., tomorrow to determine what cities shall compose the new Ohio league. Several members of the local amusement association will leave for Columbus tomorrow morning. In speaking of the new league, a Columbus, O., dispatch says:

"Erroneous are the statements to the effect that Business Manager Bobby Quinn of the Columbus club has accepted the presidency of the new league that is contemplated for seven thriving towns of this section of Ohio and Richmond, Indiana.

"It is true that some time ago, when a break in the Ohio-Penn league seemed imminent, club owners of the western division were on the alert and, in casting about for a chief executive of their probable new league, decided that Mr. Quinn would be an ideal organizer. After having a proposition made to him, the Columbus man said that he would be willing to do what he could toward getting the league foundation laid and he has done considerable work already in the interests of the prospective organization.

"However, it is no cliché that he will be the president. That matter will be settled probably at a meeting here in Columbus tomorrow, of the owners of the Marion, Mansfield, Lancaster and Newark clubs, together with gentlemen who wish to control the teams that may be placed in Springfield, Lima, Hamilton, Findlay, Sandusky or Richmond.

"So far as known, there is no other candidate for the presidency. Quinn, if some little details in connection with the office can be adjusted, will be able to assist in the complete organization of the league and to give attention to the administration for at least half the time of the playing season.

"It is understood that Richmond is already prepared to fulfill all entry requirements. Clarence Jessup is the Richmond manager, and membership of his club in the new league will give that town better baseball than it has ever had.

"There may be a scramble for the Lima franchise. That town is regarded highly by baseball men who know the situation well. It is possible that an Ohio-Penn veteran manager may be placed in charge of the club.

"Springfield will send a delegate to the meeting Tuesday and it is expected that some Hamilton gentlemen will be on hand. The former town doesn't want to go without baseball, and it will get a pretty good grade of it by coming into the fold."
