ment. A cordial welcome will again  
be extended the republicans when they  
assemble here on February 4, to select  
delegates to the national convention  
at Chicago.

### CLAMOR FOR PARCELS POST

Henry County Tillers of Soil Would  
Have Better Hitch Racks Too.

New Castle, Ind., Jan. 15.—Henry  
county farmers are enthusiastically in  
favor of a postal savings bank and  
parcels post law, according to the re-  
solutions adopted by the Farmers' In-  
stitute held in this city. A section of  
the resolutions calls upon the repre-  
sentatives in Congress to support and  
vote for these two laws. The farmers  
also went on record as favoring the  
curtailment of the liquor traffic, being  
in favor of local county option.

The section of the resolutions which  
has caused much amusement and has  
recalled the merchants of this city to  
a duty that has been neglected reads  
as follows: "Resolved, That the farm-  
ers send to Sears & Roebuck and pur-  
chase a number of posts and a plot of  
ground on which to erect hitchracks  
to hitch their horses to while trading  
with home merchants."

trains.

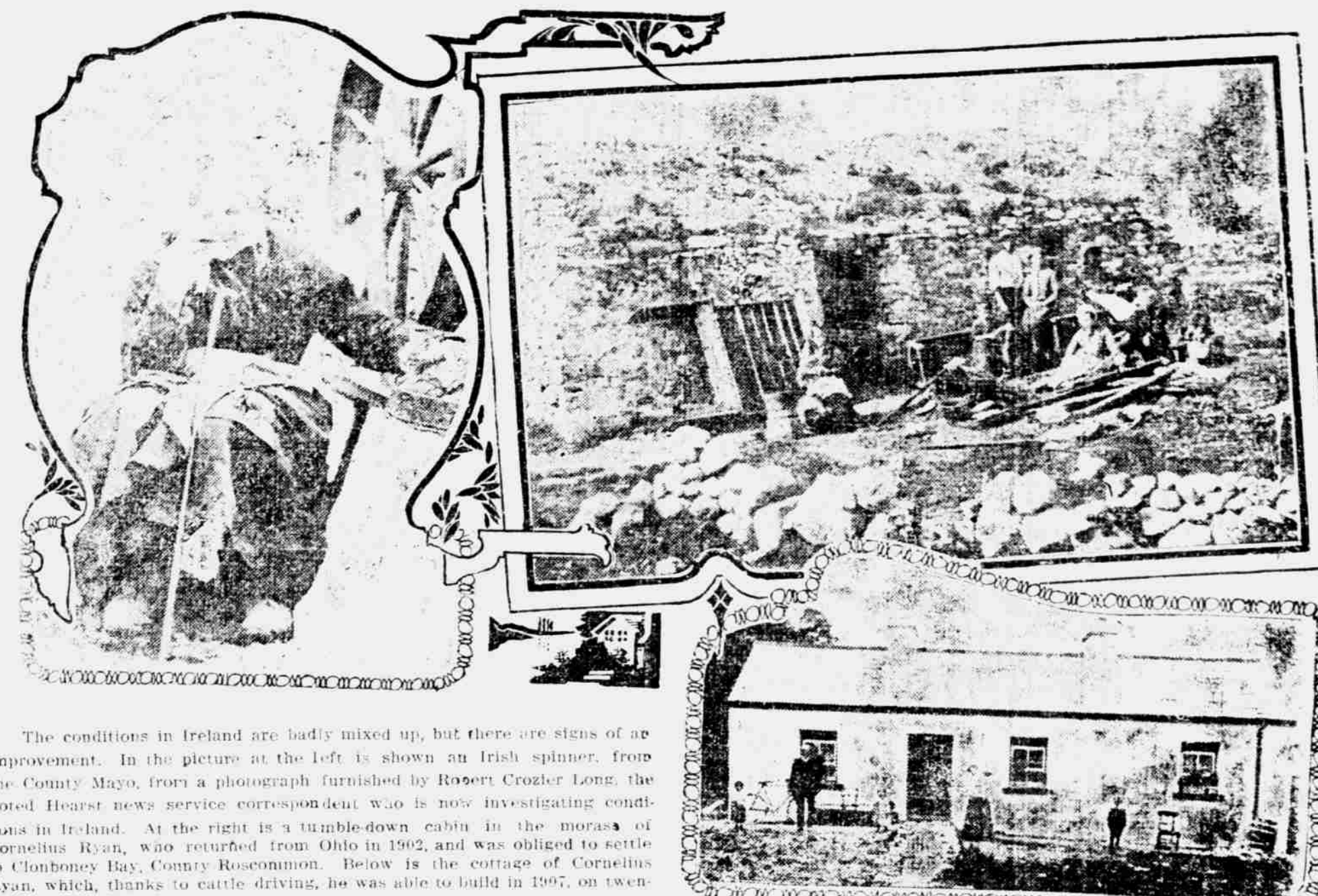
