COOLNESS HAS SPRUNG UP IN THE THAW FAMILY

Evelyn Nesbit Learned Much of the Thaw Family Skeleton and Is Holding Relatives Aloof.

JEROME WOULD LET DEFENDANT GO TO ASYLUM.

The Fact That He Admitted a Letter as Evidence, Has Led Court Attaches to This Belief.

New York, Jan. 16.—Harry Thaw's mother will be in New York some time today and the announcement has encouraged the defendant. It is reported that the revealing of the Thaw family skeleton has so shocked young Mrs. Thaw that a coolness has sprung up between her and the other members of the family. August Weber, a butler in the Thaw family was confirmed as witness this morning. He testified that Thaw's conduct was always irrational. At one time, Thaw hopped out of bed upsetting his breakfast, kicked his cigar into the fire place, the slipper following it, and finally realizing his action said "I beg your pardon."

Adam R. Beck of Allentown, Pa., formerly a teacher of Thaw, testified that as a boy Thaw was of unwhole-some health. He was always subject to tearless crying, during which time, gave animal-like howls. His eyes were cast down and he would constantly roll them. Such spells would last almost 20 minutes. Beck said he received a letter from the boy's mother, in which she said she believed his mind was affected. This letter admitted as evidence. The fact that Jerome allowed its admission would indicate that he is satisfied to let Thaw go to an asylum. Benjamin Bowman, the door-keeper of Madison Square theatre testified he heard White threaten to kill Thaw and saw his revolver. Bowman said he forthwith told Thaw.

Adhering to their promise to interpose no other defense than that of insanity in behalf of their client, the attorneys representing Harry K. Thaw at his trial yesterday continued the examination of witnesses who swore that Thaw, at various times in his life, appeared to them as mentally unsound. Practically all of the testimony was new to the case and had to do with acts practically down to the day of the tragedy itself. Then came the declaration of the two men who sat on the coroner's jury during the inquiry into Stanford White's death, all of whom declared that the defendant had followed the shooting acted irrationally. His manner and appearance were such as to cause the inquest to question his state of mind after their formal verdict had been rendered.

Thaw's Actions at Home.

After the coroner's jurors, ten of them altogether, had been disposed of, Mr. Littleton called August Weber to the stand. Weber served as a butler in the Thaw house in Lafayette square, Washington, from January to May, 1903. The witness said he formerly was in the employ of Senator Foraker, of Ohio. He related many incidents of what he described as irrationality on the part of the defendant. Thaw would order that no dinner be prepared certain evenings, and a few hours later would come in and demand to know why there was nothing to eat. He would call the butler out of his bed and give him \$5 for some trifling service. Thaw would sometimes pace the floor of the dining room in the midst of dinner, muttering to himself. Once Thaw called for a carriage at 3 a. m. and when told one was not available became hysterical and fell prone upon a couch. During these outbreaks the witness said Thaw's eyes were shiny and had a vacant stare. Weber was still on the stand when adjournment until tomorrow morning was taken.

The Plea of Specific Insanity.

The separate incidents of alleged irrational conduct on the part of the defendant were put in evidence by Mr. Littleton prior to the expert testimony that is to come. He also adduced such a mass of evidence as to Thaw's erratic conduct as to make it impossible for the district attorney to fulfill the task the law places upon him, proving Thaw sane beyond every reasonable doubt.

The prosecuting attorney are following the case as outlined by the defense and taking into consideration the fact that a specific plea of insanity has been entered this year. They declare that acquittal under the circumstances can come only with the acquittal of the defendant at the time the act was committed.

This trial is delayed until the possible holding of a coroner's inquest to determine the cause of death of Stanford White, and when this is done, the defense will have to prove his present sanity and thus gain his freedom would have to be conducted through habeas corpus proceedings.
