EDITORS BREAK BREAD IN CAPITAL

Republican Editorial Association Had Interesting Banquet Last Night.

Hemenway WAS THERE.

Indianapolis, Jan. 17.—Over 100 members of the Republican State Editorial

association met at the Claypool hotel last night for their annual banquet, which was followed today by the business session. William K. Penrod, of Logansport, president of the association, was toast master.

Senator James A. Hemenway was the principal speaker, he shared with Captain Harry New, chairman of the Republican National committee, and State Chairman Goodrich, the honor of being the special guests of the association. Other guests were Union B. Hunt, chairman of the railroad commission, who told the editors what it is accomplishing, and William Freeman, secretary of the state board of

forestry, who delivered an address on its work. All of the candidates for places on the state ticket were about the hotel lobby, but none were invited to break bread with the editors, who were determined for the evening to cut out state and local politics. There was a tinge of national politics, however, when Senator Hemenway touched up the boom for Vice President Fairbanks. His reference to him as Indiana's candidate for the presidency was well received.
