## WOMEN FIGHT FRIGHTFUL DUEL OVER THEIR LOVER AND MAY DIE

Pittsburg, Pa., Jan. 18.—Five hundred people stood horrified on an overhead bridge at North Braddock to-night, and watched two young women fight a duel with knife and revolver almost to the death in the ravine below over a twenty-year-old lover. The young man appeared nervy and himself stopped the frightful battle, though probably too late to save the life of either.

Ruth Frazier, aged 20, who clerked in a local store, and Mrs. Susan Griggsby, a widow of 25, had been rivals for the affections of Herbert Smith, a young iron molder. The women met this evening in front of Mrs. Griggsby's house beneath the Pennsylvania Railroad bridge.

Miss Frazier drew a knife and stabbed her rival twice in the breast. Mrs. Griggsby's little son appeared, screaming, and a crowd quickly gathered on the bridge, but there was no means of reaching the ravine below from the foot path at the top of the cliff.
