WOMEN FIGHT FRIGHTFUL DUEL

OVER THEIR LOVER AND MAY DIE WHO CAN WIN THE HAND OF GIPSY BRIDE

Pittsburg, Pa., Jan. 18.—Five hundred people stood horrified on an over-head bridge at North Braddock tonight, and watched two young women fight a duel with knife and revolver almost to the death in the ravine below over a twenty-year-old lover. The young man appeared nervy and himself stopped the frightful battle, though probably too late to save the life of either.

Ruth Frazier, aged 20, who clerked in a local store, and Mrs. Susan Grigsby, a widow of 25, had been rivals for the affections of Herbert Smith, a young iron master. The women met this evening in front of Mrs. Grigsby's house beneath the Pennsylvania Railroad bridge.

Miss Frazier drew a knife and stabbed her rival twice in the breast. Mrs. Grigsby's little son appeared, screaming, and a crowd quickly gathered on the bridge, but there was no means of reaching the ravine below from the foot path at the top of the cliff.

Mrs. Grigsby ran into the house,
