PRESIDENTIAL ASPIRANTS PURSUE PECULIAR METHODS

Some Who Would Like to Oc-
cupy the Chair in the White
House Are Noisy; Others
Playing the Waiting Game.

CORTELYOU NOW PLAYING GAME OF "DARK HORSE."

Up to Date He Has Success-
fully Dodged All Attempts to
Bring Him Into the Open—
Indiana Candidate Quiet.

Washington, Jan. 23.—Of course
men with presidential aspirations
which they hope to have gratified at
some time in the future are watching
the present contest for the republic-
an nomination with the view of get-
ting pointers as to the most successful
method to be followed in seeking this
high office. The methods of the can-
didate who wins the prize this year
are likely to be popular for some time
to come. If a dark horse shall carry
off the nomination aspirants may be
counted on to keep their candidacies
in the background in the future. Or if
the contest this year demonstrates
that the way to get a presidential
nomination is to go after it with federal
patronage, with press agencies,
with traveling lieutenants, etc., that
plan of campaign will become the pop-
ular one. It is certainly true that the
country has never seen a contest for a
presidential nomination that presented
a better test of all the known meth-
ods of seeking the office.

Cortelyou the Dark Horse.

George B. Cortelyou is the dark
horse at this time. His candidacy
came near getting out in the open
about the time President Roosevelt
took himself out of consideration for
a third term, but Mr. Cortelyou adroitly
drew the dark horse mantle back
over himself, and he proposes to keep
it there. Evidently his notion is
that if he came out as an avowed
candidate he would have to show
strength on the first convention ballot
in order to be considered in the race.
At no time has he been in position to
expect a great deal of first ballot sup-
port. No doubt his idea is that there
will be a deadlock in the convention,
and that, in looking around for an
available man, the convention will
turn to him. As former chairman of
the national committee, as a man who
has occupied three cabinet positions,
in each of which he has acquitted him-
self honorably, he has made many
warm friends in every section of the
country. He is counting on these
friends to come to his support when
the opportune time arrives. His po-
sition in this contest is certainly worth
the study of the men who are looking
for pointers for future use.

The Other Candidates.

Vice-President Fairbanks, Speaker
Cannon, Senator Knox, Senator La
Follette and Senator Foraker are fol-
lowing pretty much the same methods.
Not one of these is out with a brass
band seeking the nomination, and yet
each one is an avowed candidate in
the sense that he is willing his friends
shall do what they can to promote his
nomination. No one of these five
candidates has established "headquar-
ters" with a manager in charge, none
has a press bureau grinding out daily
boom stories for him, and each is re-
fraining from entering into an uncer-
tainly scramble for the nomination.

Watching the Taft Campaign.

The Taft campaign is receiving the
closest study from the seekers after
pointers because it is unique. It is the
only campaign for the nomination that
has established headquarters where a
large number of persons are on the
pay roll. No other campaign has a
press bureau, and no other campaign
has well paid agents traveling up and
down the country seeking to create
public sentiment. Since the novel
campaign was put under way, post-
cards bearing a picture of the candi-
date have been scattered broadcast,
circulars have been issued by the ton
explaining "Who Taft Is," friendly
newspapers have been persuaded to
take poll after poll for the purpose of
showing that the candidate was
ahead of all competitors, congress
has been polled to show that the can-
didate had a lot of friends in that body
etc.

Plans were made to have the can-
didate "pose" for a set of moving pic-
tures to be placed in the 20,000 nickel
theatres in operation throughout the
country, but Mr. Taft bucked on that.
"I think I have enough of a show on
my hands now," was his answer to
the request that he "pose."

RICHMOND REPRESENTED AT BIG CONFERENCE

Wm. Bailey of Home Company
Now in Chicago.

William Bailey, superintendent of
the local Home Telephone company is
attending the meeting of the Inter-
national Independent Telephone asso-
ciation, now in session in Chicago.
More than 1,100 delegates and mem-
bers are present, besides a large num-
ber of manufacturers and dealers.

The question of having telephones
declared to be common carriers, ad-
vocated by certain telephone interests
but opposed by the independent com-
panies is to come up for discussion
at this session. Another matter that
will claim attention is a proposed as-
sessment of two mills on each "operat-
ing unit," or "line," which would
amount to an increase of the com-
panies of \$60,000 a year.

CORSICAN CUSTOMS.

Curious Observances Connected With
Death and Burial.

When a Corsican woman dies she is
always buried in a new costume, which
sometimes with the poorer classes
takes up most of the family savings,
and as the heat of the climate renders
burial imperative within twenty-four
hours the new gown is generally com-
menced directly the dying person's ill-
ness assumes a serious form.

Corsicans reverence the dead, and a
feature in a funeral is the "improvisa-
tures"—women whose business it is to
improvise prose poetry to the mourn-
ers. Often this improvising is won-
derfully beautiful and breathes the
true feeling of sorrow.

The "death hunters" attend funerals
and afterward wrestle with the mourn-
ers. If a relative of the deceased gets
the better in the combat it is assumed
that his affection for the departed re-
lative was absolutely genuine.

When the corpse leaves the house
the women gather at an upper window
and, tearing out handfuls of their hair,
throw it on the coffin. The rich hire
women mourners, who scratch their
faces and are paid in proportion to
the injuries they inflict on themselves
in their paroxysms of grief.

A Corsican widow wears a strip of
black material tied on her eyes for a
week, and during that period she is
fed and led about by her friends. No
room in her house is cleaned, and no
fire lighted for the same period.

In the cemeteries is a succession of
little buildings with flat roofs and
high openings. These are the tombs,
and inside them are rich hangings,
dowers, poetry and lamps, which the
mourners place there in remembrance
of the departed.

Quaint Market Custom.

There exists at Tonnes market a cus-
tom which is believed to be without
parallel in the history of markets. A
dealer chalks up the price he gives for
butter and eggs on a stall, and all the
other dealers pay the same. This sys-
tem has gone on, and surprisingly little
friction has resulted. Some time ago
an attempt was made to break down
the custom and induce producers to
stand in the market and make the best
price they could. It was, however,
short lived, and the old system was re-
verted to.—St. James' Gazette.

LIBERALITY ON THE GOVERNMENT'S PART IS URGED

Should Grant Freely, Funds for
The Improvement of Rivers
And Harbors, Is Sentiment
Of State Congress.

RESOLUTION ASKING FOR \$50,000,000.

Prof. R. L. Sackett, Formerly
Of Earlham, Declared Mis-
sissippi Valley Would Have
100,000,000 Inhabitants.

Indianapolis, Jan. 23.—A permanent
Indiana branch of the National Riv-
ers and Harbors congress was organiz-
ed here yesterday afternoon. Henry
Hiesenberg, of Indianapolis, was
elected president; Perry A. Randall, of
St. Wayne, vice president; L. H. Odell,
of Evansville, second vice president;
Thomas A. Sims of Indianapolis, sec-
retary, and Sol Kiser of Indianapolis,
treasurer.

The convention adopted a resolution
recommending an annual appropri-
ation of \$50,000,000 by congress for the
improvement of rivers and harbors.

A report of the committee on per-
manent organization was adopted. This
proposes a plan of having the mem-
bership include individuals, firms,
municipal organizations, business
organizations and other societies,
with representation in accordance with
their membership.

F. A. W. Davis, president of the In-
dianapolis Water company, said that
White river falls 67 feet between here
and Waverly and that by a system of
locks and dams a great waterway that
would develop the state's resources
could be made.

Colonel Frank Posey of Evansville,
predicted that congress will soon make
an appropriation for a harbor on Lake
Michigan at Indiana Harbor. A dele-
gation from Lake county was here dur-
ing the convention working in behalf
of this project.

Prof. R. L. Sackett of Purdue univer-
sity, declared that the Mississippi
River valley will eventually have 100,-
000,000 inhabitants, and that better
transportation facilities must be pro-
vided for them.

Charles E. Zollars, representing the
Chicago Association of commerce; Hor-
ace Starr of Richmond; Charles S.
Bash of St. Wayne; State Forester
Freeman and others spoke of the great
benefits of the improvement of the
waterways of the state.

Evansville and St. Wayne desire to
entertain the next convention.
