JUDGE FOX MAKES ANTONIO FERRANTE SIGN CHECK FOR HALF OF HIS SAVINGS DEPOSITED IN PITTSBURGH BANK.

"HE DIDN'T LOVE HER."

For This Reason Ferrante Turned His Wife and Child Out of Their Humble Home—Does Not Seem Sorry For His Actions.

Before Antonio Ferrante was divorced from pretty little Katherine Ferrante, an American girl, he had in a Pittsburgh bank \$211. Now he only has \$211. Mrs. Ferrante was granted her divorce yesterday morning and in the afternoon Ferrante was brought before Judge Fox and asked how much money he had on deposit. He gave the amount.

The court then ordered the Italian to give half of it to his former wife. Reluctantly he signed a check for \$211, payable to Mrs. Ferrante. This was done under a threat of imprisonment in case he refused to do so.

When asked why he treated his wife and baby so cruelly the Italian angrily replied, "I didn't like 'em anymore," and that "her ways were not my ways."

"Was that any excuse for you turning her out of the house into the cold?" asked the court.

"Yes," impudently replied Ferrante. "I didn't love her any more and I didn't want to live with her." The sheriff took charge of the check signed by the Italian and after having it cashed, will turn the amount over to the girl who was so unfortunate as to marry a foreigner with Latin blood in his veins.

### FOUR FIREMEN WERE KILLED AND FIFTEEN INJURED IN BIG FIRE

BLAZE IN BALTIMORE RESULTS FATAL FOR MEMBERS OF HOSE COMPANY WHICH FOUGHT THE RUSH OF FLAMES.

### CHIEF OF COMPANY MAY DIE

His Skull Is Said to Have Been Fractured—Those Men Who Were Killed Were Badly Mangled by the Falling Debris.

Baltimore, Md., Jan. 24.—Fire broke out a short time after midnight in the upper part of the building occupied by the firm of J. Register & Sons, Holliday and Saratoga streets. The first alarm was followed by a general one calling out all the apparatus in the city. Then by a high wind from the northeast the fire spread rapidly and in a short time the north walls of the building fell. Four firemen were killed and many injured, among them George Horton, chief of the fire department.

The fire burned toward a number of old structures. A four-story building in the rear, occupied by the E. B. Read & Son company, soon caught fire and burned fiercely. The bodies of Lieutenant Frederick Harman, James Barrock, August Schirrer and John Seel, all of No. 3 engine company, were taken from beneath the burning walls. Fifteen firemen are known to have been injured. Chief Horton's skull is said to have been fractured, and he is injured internally. It is feared that he will die. Those killed were
